

Meeting Features Radio-TV Men

The second annual Broadcasting conference, held on campus under the sponsorship of the school of journalism Saturday, was attended by 131 high school delegates.

The conference was held in order to further acquaint interested students with the fields of radio and television.

The day-long conference began with a combined coffee hour, tours of the student broadcasting facilities and the registration period.

A tour of KWAX and the radio and speech departments was guided by the members of Kappa Rho Omicron, a campus broadcasting honorary. Coffee hour refreshments were served by the members of Theta Sigma Phi, women's professional journalism honorary.

The first session of the conference was an assembly. Speakers were Charles T. Duncan, acting dean of the school of journalism; Willard Mears, program director of KOIN in Portland, and James W. Frost, secretary-manager of the OSBA.

The broadcasting medium is used to encourage understanding between nations, they said. There is room in broadcasting today for those who have the ideas and the ingenuity to carry on radio ideas, they said.

The second session was a panel discussion by Willard Mears, Robert Anderson, program director for KVAL-TV; William Karl, commercial director for KUGN, Glenn Starlin, head of the speech department and instructor in educational radio.

The panel answered questions asked by the delegates. Most of the questions concerned various types of jobs available to men and women just breaking into radio and television.

Sports Announcer Speaks

After the two sessions, the students attended a luncheon which was held in the Student Union. Bob Blackburn, Portland sports announcer, was the main speaker.

After the luncheon, the delegates attended the Oregon-Idaho football games as the guests of the two universities' athletic departments.

Teacher Exams Set for Feb. 11

The National Teacher Examinations, prepared and administered annually by Educational Testing Service, will be given on Saturday, Feb. 11, 1956.

At the one-day testing session candidates may take the common examinations, which include tests in professional information, general culture, English expression, and non-verbal reasoning, and one or two out of ten optional examinations designed to demonstrate mastery of subject matter to be taught.

The University will tell prospective candidates whether or not they should take the National Teacher Examinations and which of the Optional Examinations to select.

Application forms and a bulletin of information describing registration procedure and containing sample test questions may be obtained from college officials, school superintendents, or directly from the National Teacher Examinations, Educational Testing Service, 20 Nassau St., Princeton, N. J.

Completed applications accompanied by proper examination fees, will be accepted until Jan. 13, 1956.

Price Will Leave Today to Attend Chicago Meet

Price is one of the secretaries of the meeting and a member of the nine-member council, composed of university professors and deans, which will conduct a study for the Association for Education in Journalism.

The Fund for the Republic, a subsidiary of the Ford Foundation, made a \$5,000 grant to the Association for Education in Journalism, to determine the feasibility of a study of the American press performance during the 1956 presidential campaign.

General chairman of the meeting will be Raymond B. Nixon, professor at the University of Minnesota. This is a meeting of 25 professors of journalism, communications specialists in other social science fields, and some daily newspaper executives.

Civil Commission Announces Exams

The United States Civil Service commission has announced examinations for the following positions: international information specialist, information and editorial positions, and engineers for duty in western states and in Alaska.

Also, the civil service announced examinations for custodial laborer in the Post Office service.

To qualify for the information positions, applicants must have had appropriate informational experience. For engineer positions, education or experience is required.

Competition in examinations for custodial laborer will be restricted by law to persons entitled to veteran preference.
