

# Boughton Conducts Local Symphony

This year the Eugene-Springfield Symphony is being conducted by George Boughton, associate professor of music at the University.

Boughton began his career early, receiving training in community and theatre orchestras in western New York. When he was 16 he was allowed to direct theatre orchestras when his teacher was sick, and shortly thereafter he was made a principal conductor.

He has had varied and valuable experience in most types of theatrical music from musical comedy to light opera. In 1928 he entered the college field and since then he has conducted college orchestras and bands in Kansas, South Dakota. Just prior

to joining the staff of the U of O, he conducted the band and coached the orchestra at SMU.

He came to Oregon in 1945 and since then his activities have been largely in the field of chamber music and as a solo violinist. During the season 1954-55 he was concertmaster and assistant conductor for the Eugene-Springfield Symphony.

Because of the recent agreement between the University and the Eugene-Springfield Symphony, students will be admitted to all the symphony's presentations free of charge. Anyone not attending the University may obtain season tickets at all music and piano stores, or they may be bought at the door before the Nov. 10 concert.

There will be a total of four concerts, the one on Nov. 10, one on Jan. 10, another on April 5, and the last one of the season on May 3.

# Season Ticket Sale Is Over Tomorrow

Time is growing short to buy extra season tickets that will be needed to take that special date to the five University Theatre productions.

Season tickets will not be sold after 8 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 5, but can be purchased for \$5 at the University Theatre box office from 1 to 8 p.m. today and Saturday.

Holder of season tickets may select their seats by mail before the box office opens to the general public. However they can not send money along with the stubs for additional seats.

For this reason, Dori Barsness, UT business manager, encourages those who like to take their dates to UT productions to buy another season ticket now. Otherwise when they ran out of season ticket stubs, they will not have as good selection of seats.

Tickets are worth \$6 in general admission seats.

Season ticket holders also receive free tickets to special bonus attractions and have the privilege of making advance orders for the UT arena-style production.

Tickets are transferable so that any ticket may be used at any show, be loaned to a friend or given away.

The best information about theatre doings are sent to season tickets holders in "The Prompter." It gives information about the coming shows, and when reservations for it can be made.

# Ballaine Named Committee Head

Wesley C. Ballaine, director of the Bureau of Business Research and professor of business administration, was named again as chairman of the publications committee of the Associated Bureaus of Business and Economic Research at their recent convention in Washington, D.C.

Chief function of the committee this year, according to Ballaine, will be the publication of an index of the various publications produced by bureaus of business and economic research in American universities. Approximately 50 such universities will be included.

This will be the first time such an index has been published by the organization. Distribution will be made to libraries, business firms, and market research organizations.

The index will be completed by next summer and will cover the years since 1950 with supplements to be added in the future. Promoters hope that it will make the publications of the universities better known and therefore more readily available.

Ballaine reports that the convention discussed operating problems and practical aids to solving these. Reports were given by experts in the field.
