

Students to Hear Lapp At Thursday Assembly

In his discussions of atomic energy, Dr. Ralph E. Lapp, noted physicist, emphasizes the aspect of nuclear weapons; that in relation to the cost of other techniques of waging war, atomic bombs are inexpensive.

Lapp will speak to University students Thursday at 1 p.m. in the Student Union ballroom.

He points out that the temptation will become irresistible to rely upon atomic weapons for security, with the result that eventually no nation will be in a position to wage a major war in any other way.

"One thing seems clear," says the scientist. "Never before has the final outcome of a war been

so predictable—there will be no winner even though one may emerge under the assumption he is the victor."

The author of "The New Force," published in 1953, he writes the story of atoms and people in both peace and war. Lapp discusses the pros and cons of large and small bombs, the experiments on tactical weapons ranging from a bomb which can be used in tactical aircraft to one which could be fitted as a warhead in a guided missile. He also cites the progress being made in industrial use of atomic energy.

Lapp will be entertained at a luncheon by the assembly committee and interested faculty members Thursday noon.

Pupils May Apply For Fellowships

Four Henry Fellowships are available to American students for the year 1956-57. They will be tenable for one year at Oxford or Cambridge and valued at approximately \$1500 each.

Candidates must be unmarried American citizens. Both men and women may apply. Preference will be given to applicants who have received their bachelor's degree since June, 1951, and to those now in their last year of undergraduate work who expect to receive the bachelor's degree by July 1, 1956.

Each candidate must submit evidence of distinction in some recognized branch of learning and must also present a definite scheme of study or research proposed to be carried out at Oxford or Cambridge.

Applications from American candidates must be sent to the Office of the Secretary of Yale University, New Haven, Conn., or to the Office of the Secretary to the Corporation of Harvard University, Cambridge 38, Mass., on or before Jan. 15, 1956.
