Two months ago the mid-November date between Oregon State and California figured to be only another football game in the Pacific Coast conference, but Monday it added up to the top clash on the Saturday West Coast menu.

The boisterous Beavers, riding high in the Rose Bowl race, are in undisputed possession of second place in PCC standings. And California, kicked around by everybody, looms suddenly as a possible spoiler with the sudden discovery of a twin touchdown punch.

Upsets Hit Standings

The year-long upset wave rolled higher than usual throughout the conference last Saturday to produce the unique situation in the standings.

Two favorites toppled in the topsy-turvy derby—and the chief victim was proud Southern California. The Trojans, who figured all year to decide the championship in their Nov. 19 clash with UCLA, were dumped unceremoniously by Stanford, 28-20, as the up-and-down Indians reached the peak.

Cal Halfbacks Lead Way

Dropped also was Washington, victim of Cal's tiny Donn Smith and Nat Brazill, 20-6. The Huskies, once the conference dark-horse, have failed to win a game since their upset of USC five weeks ago.

The rest of last week's slate ran off on schedule. Oregon State racked up a 33-14 win over Idaho, Oregon belted Washington State, 35-0, and UCLA clobbered College of the Pacific, 34-0, to become the nation's top scoring team.

Huskies Try Bruins

Only two other PCC games, in addition to the Oregon State-California clash at Berkeley, are on this week's program. Washington travels to UCLA and the Bruins can be counted upon to shoot the works while Oregon visits Stanford where the Indians are likely to remain right on the warpath.

Rounding out the schedule are non-conference contests between Washington State and San Jose State at Pullman and Idaho and Brigham Young at Provo, Utah.

Duck Cross-Country Team Faces Beavers

The University of Oregon cross-country crew will meet the Oregon State college harriers 4:30 p.m. Wednesday at the Eugene Country club.

The date has been moved up from Friday when it was originally scheduled to permit a possible jaunt of the Oregon freshmen to Vancouver, B.C. over the weekend.

Bear Surprise Tops

Cal's toppling of Washington was the surprise of the week.

The Bears, completely clueless in the past, discovered midget halfbacks Smith and Brazill behind a pile of equipment bags and the two ran the Huskies ragged.

The pair together weigh 285 pounds—Smith 143, Brazill 142—only a smidgeon less than Husky tackle Fred Robinson, but they had the moxie to get the business done for the Bears' initial PCC win.

Brodie Fires Stanford

John Brodie was the big man in Stanford's triumph. The 188-pound quarterback passed the Trojans silly with 14 completions for 216 yards. The triumph was the Indians' first in conference play and eliminated USC completely from the championship race.

UCLA turned loose three tailbacks—Sam Brown, Ronnie Knox and Gerry McDougall—to wreck COP's vaunted line and roll up its easy victory. The Bruins now need only to beat Washington and USC to repeat as PCC champs and move into the Rose Bowl.

Kappa Sig, SAM, TKE Get IM Wins

Kappa Sigma, Sigma Alpha Mu and Tau Kappa Epsilon walked away with easy A victories in Monday intramural volleyball action.

Delta Upsilon and Sederstrom hall were forced to go to full three-game series, but also got wins. Phi Gamma Delta got a forfeit win from Pi Kappa Alpha.

The Kappa Sigs dispatched Phi Kappa Sigma, 15-10 and 15-11; the Tekes had little trouble with Chi Psi, 15-15 and 15-12, and the Sammies dropped Lambda Chi Alpha, 15-2 and 15-9, to complete the two-game sweeps.

Sederstrom had only four of the regular six man team, but bounced French hall, 15-10, 10-5 and 15-0. The DU's were ahead of Alpha Tau Omega, 4-3, in the final game when time ran out, so Delta Upsilon took the victory. The ATO's had dropped the first game, 15-11, but came back, 15-6, in the second before falling behind to lose.

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Tad Weed Gets Boot Out of Pro Kicking

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — The little man whose accurate place-kicking helped Ohio State university's football team to a national championship in 1954, says he's getting "quite a boot" out of professional football.

"Didn't mean it as a pun," says 145-pound, 5'5" Tad Weed. The kicking specialist—probably the smallest player in pro football—is spending his weekends performing with the Pittsburgh Steelers. Weekdays he's attending classes at OSU.

It was Tad's own special boot with the flared toe which contributed seven of Pittsburgh's 13 points as the Steelers lost, 27-13, to the Chicago Cards Saturday night.

Just in to Kick

Weed was on the field against the Cards just long enough to kick two field goals and one extra point.

If Weed gets a "boot" out of playing with the Steelers, his performance Saturday was also a big lift to Steeler Coach Walt Kiesling.

"We're glad to have him, believe me," said Kiesling. "I figure we're still in contention for the

National Football league Eastern title, and Weed will help us plenty."

Weed, who yearns to carry the football as well as kick it, is "deadly from anywhere near the 30-yard line," says Kiesling. "After 30 yards he might miss."

Tad says he will practice about two hours daily here on his kicking. He joins the Steelers on Friday for practice, returning to the campus and his home here after his weekend chore is finished.

'Nice of OSU'

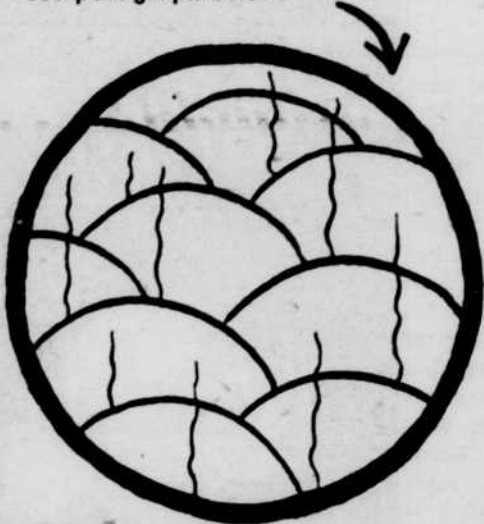
"It's very nice of them (Ohio State) to let me do all this running around," says Tad. Tad also was pretty good to Ohio State when he was on the varsity. His toe contributed to the Buckeye Rose Bowl victory, the Big Ten title and the mythical national championship last year.

That toe was the victory margin when the College All Stars edged the Cleveland Browns, 30-27, last Aug. 12. Weed, who kicked more than 10,000 consecutive practice conversions beforehand, kicked three field goals and two extra points for 11 points in that game.

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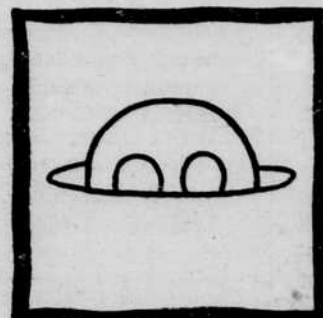


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
