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Rules Listed for HC Noise Parade

Living organizations entering the Homecoming noise parade Friday, November 18, must observe several rules for the parade which have been set up by chairmen Carol Aiken and Bob Morrell.

One fact that has not been thoroughly understood, according to Miss Aiken, is that the number given each vehicle is for judging purposes only, and does not determine the order of the vehicles in the parade.

Other rules are as follows:

1. Vehicles must be single conveyances. Semi-trucks are permissible if the bed does not exceed 60 feet.

2. The name of the organizations and the number must appear on both sides of each entry. There will be a 10-point penalty if the name and number are missing.

3. The vehicles must be at the starting point by 6 p.m. or a 10-point penalty will be assessed.

4. The parade will start at approximately 6:30 p.m.

5. The parade will form on Agate street with the head of the procession at 15th. Vehicles will take their places in line on a first-come first-served basis. The procedure will be facilitated if vehicles begin forming on the left side of Agate street soon after 3 p.m. All entries should enter Agate at 18th.

Judging Basis

Judging of the floats will be based upon the following point system:

1. Spirit of those on the float and following the float: 40 points.
2. Sustained noise in the one-block judging area: 30 points.
3. Ingenuity and originality in noise-making: 30 points.

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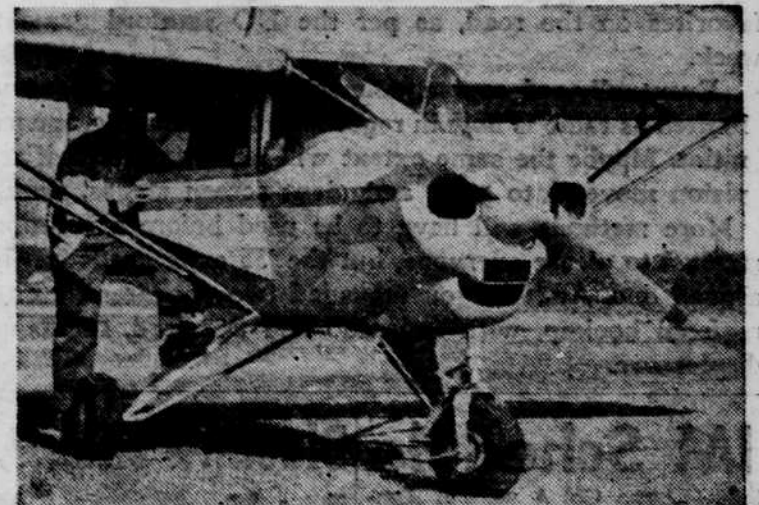
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
