C. L. Constance, registrar, returned Friday from a meeting of the Pacific Coast Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admission Officers in Berkeley, Calif., Nov. 6 through 9.

Around 200 people from Arizona, California, Oregon, Washington, Idaho and British Columbia attended the meeting.

Among topics discussed were enrollment increase, what can be done about expanding and setting up institutions, changing admission requirements and other means of providing education.

A joint meeting with the Foreign Student advisers and representatives of the U.S. State department was also held.

The next annual meeting will be in November, 1956, in Spokane with University of Idaho registrar presiding.

Alums should register during the coffee hours held after the Oregon-OSC game at their living organizations. Alumni who are not affiliated with any living organization may register at the booth in the Student Union from 2 to 4 p.m. Friday and 9 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Saturday. Anyone who has attended the University may register.

Each alum is to register his name, address, the class in which he graduated or would have graduated, the living organization with which he was affiliated and the living organization to which he wants to credit his presence.

Wilson to Discuss Role of Lobbyist

Students and faculty are invited to hear E. Raymond Wilson, executive secretary for the Friends Committee on National Legislation, discuss the role of a lobbyist in the American democratic processes at 2 p.m. today, in Commonwealth 332, according to Waldo Schumacher, professor of political science.

Wilson will draw on his long personal experience on capitol hill in explaining both the good and bad aspects of pressures on Congress.

As lobbyist for the largest religious-oriented expression of political concern on capitol hill, Wilson has at times, represented controversial and unpopular

issues before Congress.

After a few introductory remarks, Wilson will ask for questions.

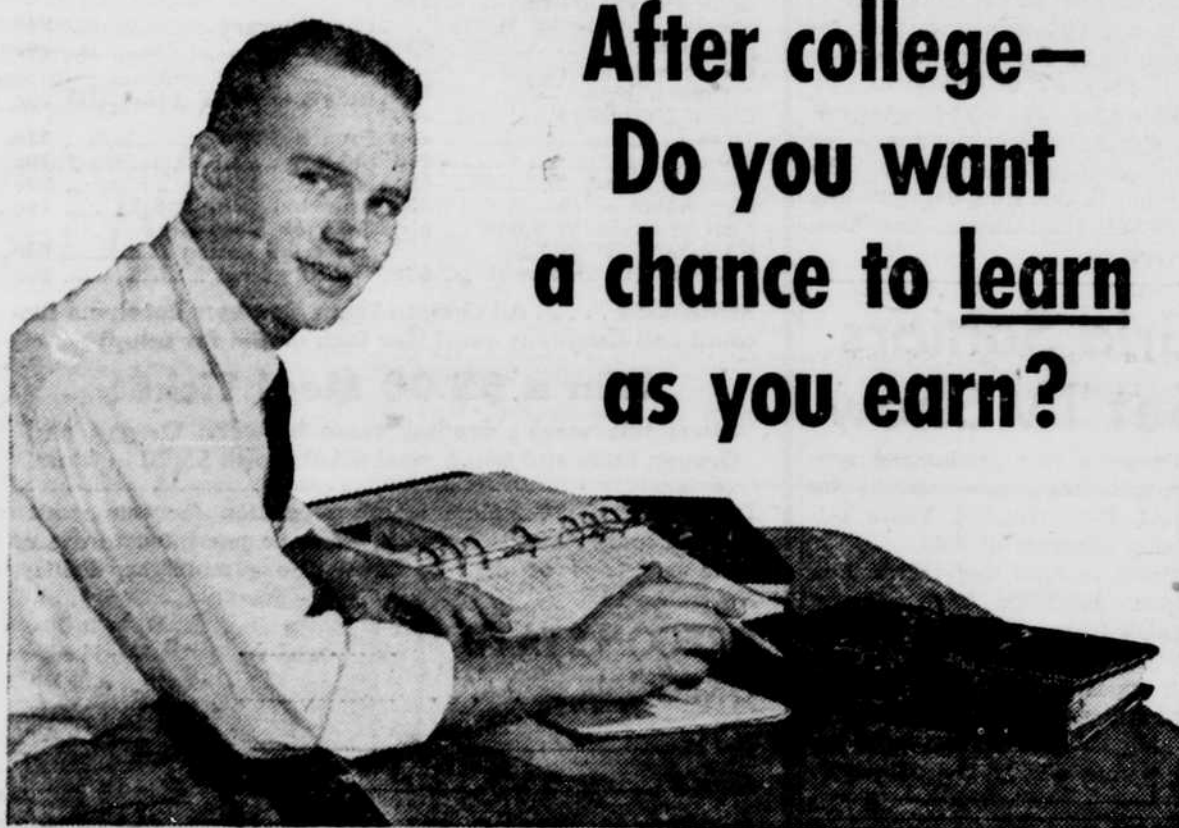
