

Ground-Breaking Program Scheduled for Boathouse

The second step in the Millrace restoration program will be started Saturday at 11:45 a.m. at ground-breaking ceremonies for the new University boat house.

Orville Thompson, president of the Oregon Alumni association, will turn the first shovel of dirt. The building is to be located on the north bank of the Millrace, east of the physical plant.

Members of the student-faculty Millrace committee, the alumni executive committee, friends of the University Millrace and University administration will be present at the ceremony.

Buildings plans are for a struc-

ture to house 20 canoes. Boat house and Millrace facilities are to be handled by the Student Union as part of the SU Board's recreational program.

President Wilson authorized \$2000 to construct the boat house and buy four canoes. Final plans for the design and site of the structure are to be approved by the campus planning committee.

The boat house will be completed by spring term and canoes will be available then for rental to townspeople and students.

Sam Vahey, ASUO vice president, is chairman of the Millrace committee.

Suspension Is Penalty For Student Vandalism

"According to an agreement reached a number of years ago between Oregon State college and the University of Oregon, it has been felt that the time is now ripe to announce the joint hands-off policy between the two institutions regarding acts of vandalism and other destruction of property.

"We approve of school spirit. We believe that it adds not only

to the interest in, but also the values to be derived from Oregon-Oregon State athletic competition. But we believe that it is best expressed on the playing field and in the cheering sections, and by justifiable pride in our institutions, and not by destruction and vandalism. Therefore we urge our students not to participate in raids or other activities likely to result in property damage or personal injury, and as a further deterrent, we agree that:

1. Our students, individually and collectively, shall be liable for the costs of repairing damage at the other institution.
2. We will suspend any of our students apprehended in such pre-game activities."

French Minister To Speak Here

Pierre Millet, minister plenipotentiary of France to the United States, will speak to interested faculty members and graduate students tonight at 8 p.m. in the Allen Memorial room.

The minister plenipotentiary is second in importance only to the French ambassador to the United States.

Millet will speak on the French North African problem tonight. He will present the French views on this situation.

Also participating in the discussion will be a panel composed of C. T. Duncan, acting dean of the school of journalism, as moderator; J. C. Brown, instructor of political science; and Gordon Wright, head of the history department.

Millet, stopping in Eugene on his way from Portland to San Francisco, will be a guest at President O. Meredith Wilson's luncheon Saturday, and will be his guest at the Homecoming game.

Plans Displayed For 'Anchorage'

The results of the weekend "Anchorage" project done by the third, fourth and fifth-year architecture students are on display now in the Student Union art gallery. These displays will be there until Thanksgiving.

The 12-hour weekend project was under the direction of W. S. Hayden, professor of architecture and included sketches, models, perspectives and floor plans for the proposed anchorage.

The plans, which will be turned into the ASUO millrace committee, include facilities for a boat house, snack bar, banquet dining rooms and parking space.

Site for the drawings was designated as north of the millrace and east of the physical plant.

The anchorage development is only one of the future steps planned by the millrace committee. Already approved is a temporary structure for the boathouse.

The ASUO millrace committee has the approval for re-engineering of the waterflow system of the millrace, and arrangements are being made with the city of Eugene for sharing costs of improving and maintaining the millrace.

A campaign is being launched by the committee to raise funds for the anchorage. President O. Meredith Wilson designated Homecoming weekend as the time to appeal to the alumni to help rebuild this part of old Oregon campus life.

The anchorage will be operated and administered by the Student Union board.

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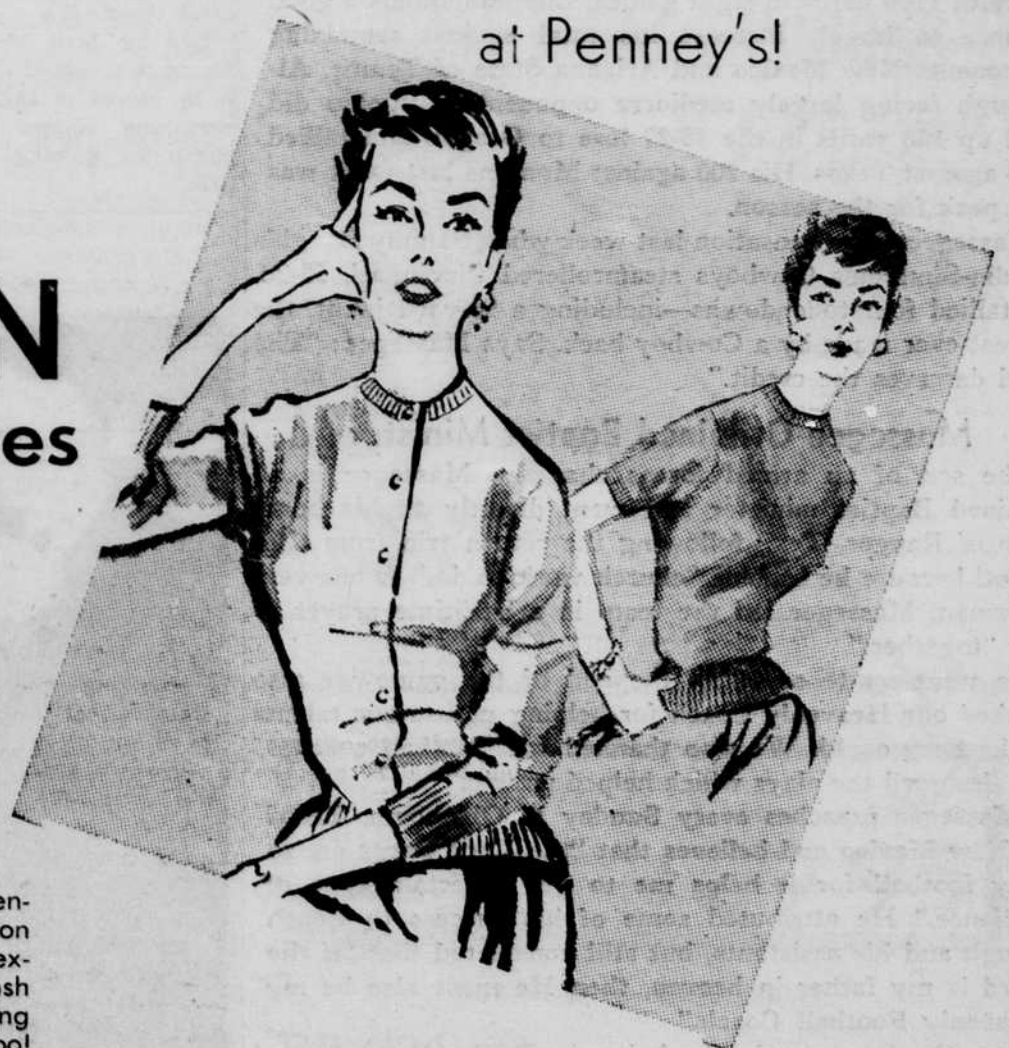
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
