

Duck Hoop Squad To Meet Beavers

Minus the services of junior guard Rich Costi, the Oregon Webfoot basketball team will be aiming their practice sessions this week toward the season's opener, a non-conference clash with Oregon State Friday night in McArthur Court.

The speedy Costi suffered a wrist fracture in a Tuesday workout and is expected to be out for the season. Coach Bill Borchert said he had expected to use Costi this year in his new "motion" offense because of his speed.

Colorado Coming

Following the clash with the Beavers the Ducks will entertain Colorado's Buffaloes on Monday night. The Buffs were third-place finishers in the NCAA national tourney last year, but have lost most of their Big Seven conference title team.

This year's competition will be under the new round-robin system in which southern teams (Cal and USC) will invade Eugene to face the Ducks in counting action.

The Webfoot starting five is expected to consist of four lettermen and a sophomore reserve. Max Anderson at center, Ray Bell at forward and Jerry Ross at guard are all two-year veterans, while guard Phil McHugh was a regular last year as a sophomore.

Franklin Touted

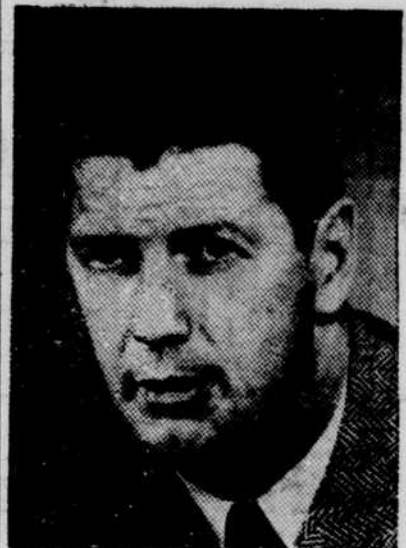
Charley Franklin, a 6-3 transfer from Los Angeles City College, is expected to take up some of the slack left in the Duck offense with the departure of all-

RAMS REGAIN LEAD

Cards, Colts, Redskins, Rams Win NFL Games

The heretofore timid Chicago Cardinals turned into touchdown terrors to snap the Chicago Bears' winning streak at six games and dump their cross-town rivals out of the Western conference lead Sunday with a stunning 53-14 upset in the National Football league.

Cards Run Wild

The Cardinals, unhampered by a field made muddy by a snow storm which started just before the game, unloaded seven TDs and shackled the potent Bear attack at just 25 yards, rushing while gaining their biggest triumph ever in the intra-city squabble.

With the defeat, the Bears took a back seat to the Los Angeles Rams, who regained the Western lead with a 23-21 decision over the Philadelphia Eagles on three last period field goals by Les Richter.

In the Eastern conference, the Cleveland Browns were jolted with a 35-35 tie by the New York Giants, but managed to retain possession of first place. Runnerup Washington closed in for only a halfgame deficit by thumping Pittsburgh's Steelers 23-14. It was the Redskins fourth straight triumph.

Colts Bash 49ers

In the only other game, the Baltimore Colts rammed San Francisco into a last place tie with idle Detroit in the Western, defeating the 49ers 26-14.

The Bears, favored by 16 points never had a chance against the Cards, who had won only three of nine previous games.

By the half, it was 27-7 and the Cardinals were off and flying. Ollie Matson, Don Stonesifer and Dave Mann each scored two TDs as the Cards gained 474 yards—301 by rushing. One of Matson's TDs came on a 77-yard punt return.

Quarterback Ed Brown, whose passing sparked the Bears' winning streak, tried seven tosses—and didn't complete a one.

The Rams looked like comfortable winners but then had to scramble to pull from behind on Richter's 26-yard goal with only 7 seconds left.

Hirsch Tallies

Norm Van Brocklin hit Elroy Hirsch on a 72-yard pass play and connected with Tom Fears for a 23-yard scoring play for a 14-0 first quarter lead.

It was 14-7 at the start of the final quarter, but after Richter kicked 17 and 10-yard goals, the Eagles went gunning, scoring twice on passes by Bobby Thomason for a 21-20 lead. It was Los Angeles' first victory in history over the Eagles.

Ray Krouse, the Giants' 260-pound tackle, blocked a field goal attempt by Lou Groza in the final seconds to give New York the tie. Earlier, Krouse and Ray

Heinrich Sees Action

Twice frustrating the great Groza should be enough for any team, but the Giants wouldn't stand still. Don Heinrich and Chuck Conerly alternated at quarter, but the veteran Conerly was on the job as the Giants scored three second half TDs to overcome a 21-14 Cleveland lead.

Leo Elter took off on 20 and 33-yard scoring runs and Vic Janowicz added a field goal and conversion to get the Redskins home safe. The four points gave Janowicz a scoring lead tie with Detroit's Doak Walker at 7.

Scooter Scudero scored the other Washington TD on a 49-yard run as the Steelers, razed all the way by their home fans, lost No. 5 in a row.

Shaw Scores

George Shaw went 21 yards up the middle for a TD that killed a late San Francisco rally and gave Baltimore third place in the Western ahead of idle Green Bay.

WSC Team Picks Crabtree, James

Evidently remembering the 35-0 walloping handed them in their Homecoming game with Oregon, the Washington State Cougars named Duck backs Tom Crabtree and Dick James to their all-opponent team for 1955.

Crabtree tied with guard Orlando Ferrante of USC in collecting the largest number of votes of the 37 cast, 19. James was picked by nine Cougars.

Others on the team were ends Rommie Loudd of UCLA and Jim Carmichael of Cal; tackles John Witte of Oregon State and Gil Moreno of UCLA; guard Hardiman Cureton of UCLA; center Wayne Walker of Idaho; and backs Sam Brown of UCLA and Credell Green of Washington.
