Over 9,000 Students Did Study Abroad in 1954-55

More than 9,000 U.S. students studied abroad in 47 foreign countries and political areas in 1954-55, according to results of a recent survey.

The survey was conducted by the Institute of International Education. Questionnaires were sent to 1000 institutions of higher learning in 74 countries and political areas. Of these, 379 had American students enrolled.

Of a 9262 student total, 59 per cent were enrolled in European schools, 15 per cent were in Mexico, and 14.8 per cent were in Canada.

Four Nations Predominant

Four countries had over 1000 Americans in their schools. Included were Mexico, 1395; Canada, 1374; Italy, 1084 and United Kingdom, 1009.

Other European countries with more than 100 U.S. students included Germany, 834; France, 805; Switzerland, 759; the Netherlands, 200; Spain, 165; Austria, 158; and Belgium, 134.

Of 624 students in the Far East, 491 were in the Philippines and 211 in Japan. The Near East

had 141. In the Western Hemisphere, in addition to Mexico and Canada, there were 51 students enrolled in Caribbean countries and 100 in South America. Peru had 85 of the latter total.

Some Study in Africa

There were 31 students in Africa. Oceania received 85 students.

Liberal arts led the fields of subjects studied with 1973 stu-

dents. Medicine, with 1718, and theology with 764, followed.

Students in other leading areas of study included social sciences, 753; creative arts, 477; natural and physical sciences, 415; business administration, 151; engineering, 105; education, 59, and agriculture, 21. Courses of study were reported for 79.1 per cent of the students covered in the survey.
