Second Webfoot to Play On West Shrine Squad

Oregon team captain and stalwart tackle Lon Stiner was added to the West shrine team Tuesday. Stiner joins halfback Dick James who was picked earlier, on the all-star squad, which will meet a similar team from the East on Dec. 31 in San Francisco.

Stiner, a regular for the Webfoots for the past two years, commented Tuesday night that his selection was "one of the greatest thrills" of his life.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Nine Pacific Coast Conference players, including three each from Stanford and Southern California, were named to the 24-man West squad for the 31st annual East-West Shrine football game here Dec. 31.

The 24-man East squad was announced Monday in New York.

The West unit, announced by game publicity director Francis Powers, was picked by the three-man coaching staff headed by

Jess Hill of Southern California. His assistants are Len Casanova of Oregon and Dal Ward of Colorado.

The Trojan trio selected includes quarterback Jimmy Contratto, guard Orlando Ferrante and end Leon Clarke. The Stanford men named are fullback Bill Tarr, listed as a halfback; center Joe Long and guard Tony Mosich.

Four other schools landed two men each on the squad. They are Southern Methodist, with quarterback John Roach and Tackle Forest Gregg; Oregon, with halfback Dick James and tackle Lon Stiner; Arkansas, with halfback Preston Carpenter and fullback Henry Moore, and College of the Pacific with end A. D. Williams and guard Gene Cronin.

Hayes Bosses East

The East team, which will be coached by Woody Hayes of Ohio State's big 10 champions, is headed by Howard (Hopalong) Cassidy, the Buckeye All-American halfback.

The Shrine game, which will be played at Kezar Stadium, has been a complete sellout since October, the earliest that all 61-
