

Schleicher Tells Group at Lecture About Indian Communist Woes

Charles P. Schleicher, professor of political science, said, "my feeling is that Indian Communism will develop and gain more strength in the future," at the browsing room lecture Wednesday night. Schleicher said that communism is particularly strong among intellectual classes and that vigorous leaders in colleges are often communists.

Schleicher was speaking from the impressions he gained as a Fulbright award professor last year at Allahabad university.

Economic Future Vital

He did not discuss what he called, "the most important topic concerning India—her economic future," but instead spoke on the background against which this development will take place.

Illiteracy rate is over 80%, he said, and there are only about 250,000 university students, 10% as many as in the United States.

India has a great diversity of tongues, Schleicher added. The goal is to make Hindi the national language by 1965; at present English serves in that capacity.

Hinduism, the main religion, he said ranges from nature worship to enlightened self-sacrifice. Untouchability, the product of the caste system, has been outlawed, and it is breaking down in the urban areas, but is still strong in the villages.

He said that Prime Minister Nehru has a tremendous hold on the Indian masses and holds the heterogeneous Congress party together with a strong hand.

Schleicher concludes his talk with some observations on Indian attitudes toward the United States. "Whatever may be said for the 'New Conservatism' in America," he said, "it is out of tune with the new revolution in Asia."

"Indians are uncertain whether America is 'Leaves of Grass' or 'Grapes of Wrath,'" he told the audience.

Funeral Services Scheduled Today For H. R. Taylor, Ex-Coffee Shop Prop.

Funeral services will be held today for Herschel R. Taylor, who for more than 20 years operated a coffee shop adjacent to the campus.

Taylor, 64, owned Taylor's Coffee Shop at the corner of 13th and Kincaid from 1930 until about four years ago. He had previously operated the University Book Store and the Campus Shop since he returned to Eugene from World War I.

Taylor enlisted in the army

at the beginning of the First World War. After the war he remained in the reserve, and served again in World War II. He reached the rank of major. Taylor is a past district commander of the American Legion.

Services will be held today at 2 at Poole-Larsen chapel, with the Rev. Wesley Nicholson of the First Congregational church officiating. He will be buried at Westlawn Memorial cemetery.

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
