

Civil Service Positions Open for Caseworker, Welfare Supervisor

Application forms CS 100 are now available for public welfare supervisor civil service positions at \$300 to \$400 a month and caseworker at \$280 to \$360 a month.

Applications may be obtained from the offices of the State Civil Service commission, 102 Public Service building, Salem, or 304 State Office building, Portland, or any local office of the Oregon State Employment service.

Applications will be accepted until further notice.

Eligibility for a position as supervisor is determined by fulfillment of minimum qualifications and an examination consisting of an evaluation of experience and training as indicated on the candidate's application form.

Qualifications, besides full citizenship in the United States, are five years of progressively responsible full time paid experience in social work in an accepted welfare agency, including two years of experience in a supervisory, administrative or consultative capacity, graduate from a four-year college or university and one year of graduate training in an approved school of social work, or an equivalent combination of experience and training.

Names of persons accepted for the examination will be placed on an existing eligible list in order of score. These persons will fill present and future vacancies on the State Public Welfare commission and the State Civil Defense agency.

Eligibility for a position of caseworker is determined by completion of four years of college or university training with courses in the social sciences or any equivalent combination of experience and training, full citizenship in the United States and an examination. Professional work in teaching, nursing, Campfire Girls, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, YWCA, YMCA, Red Cross, or employment service will substitute for two years of college training.

The examination will consist of a written test and an evaluation of the experience and training of the applicant. Sociology, psychology, economics and political science, and of current economic and social trends, interviewing, appreciation of individual and environmental problems, and the ability to deal with these problems will be the areas covered by the test.

Caseworker jobs are limited in scope in the study and determination of eligibility of persons requiring public welfare assistance and in rendering related case work services. Employees may make recommendations on a case but they cannot make final decisions.

A trial service period of six months must be completed before an applicant can receive a permanent appointment. Veterans who have been honorably discharged have a preference over other applicants.

Commission Sets Examination Date

The Oregon State Civil Service Commission has announced a competitive examination for the position of personnel assistant. Any college graduate or June, 1956, graduate is eligible for the examination which will be given in Portland, Salem, Corvallis, and Eugene on Jan. 21.

All interested applicants may obtain further information from the offices of the State Civil Service Commission, 102 Public Service Building, Salem, Oregon. Applications must be postmarked not later than Jan. 14, 1956. Starting salary for the position will be \$295.

State Announces Biologist Positions

Examinations for the positions of Aquatic Biologist and Game Biologist have been announced by the Oregon State Civil Service Commission. Applications must be filed on or before Jan. 9, 1956 at the State Civil Service Commission office, 102 Public Service Building, Salem.

Applicants must be United States citizens and residents of the State of Oregon. Aquatic Biologist applicants should be graduates of a four-year college or university with major work in the sciences pertaining to fisheries, biology or ecology.

Game Biologist applicants should have major work in game management or ecology. June graduates will be accepted. A certified copy of his college transcript must accompany the candidate's application. Veterans will be given preference in the exams.

Civil Service Sets Intern Exams

A civil service examination for Dietetic Intern in Veterans Administration hospitals in Los Angeles, California; Bronx, N.Y.; Hines, Illinois; Memphis, Tennessee; and Houston, Texas, has been announced.

Applicants must have received a bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university and have completed courses of study in appropriate fields.

After a 12-month training course, Interns will be eligible for promotion to a Dietitian position, which pays from \$3,670 to \$4,525 a year.

Applications will be accepted through March 1 for classes beginning July 1 or Sept. 15, and should be sent to the Board of Civil Service Examiners, Veterans Administration, Washington 25, D.C.

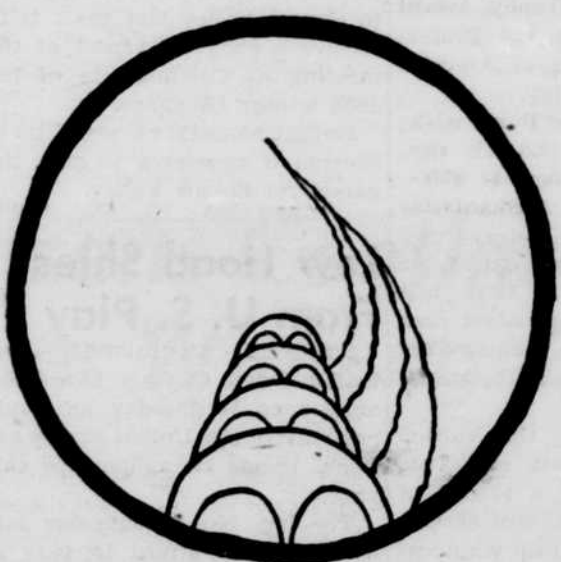

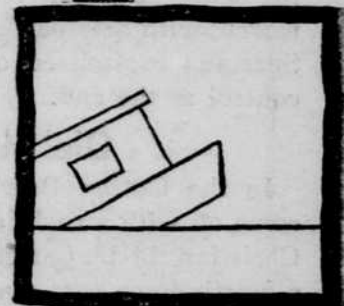

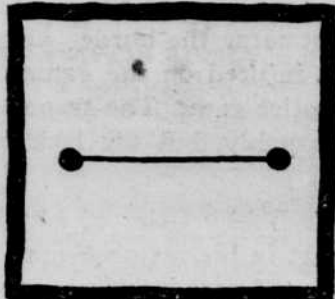
