Second Run Films Provide Best Theatre Entertainment

Second-run films constitute the best in the weekend's film fare in the Eugene area. Closest is the Mayflower which brings back two English films starting Sunday.

"Wuthering Heights," based on the novel by Emily Bronte, features Sir Laurence Olivier and Merle Oberon in the leading roles. Both turn in excellent performances. Co-feature is "Black Narcissus," starring Deborah Kerr, David Farrar and Sabu.

Through Saturday the Mayflower continues its showing of "Svengali," master of Trilby. Hildegarde Neff, Donald Wolfelt and Terrence Morgan play in the film. Its chief asset is the short distance from campus that the film is playing.

Excellent Cast

"East of Eden" and "Battle Cry" return as a double bill... again, this time to the Fox. James Dean gives an excellent performance as Cal and Julie Harris is touching as Abra. Jo Van Fleet and Raymond Massey head the rest of the fine cast. Elia Kazan's direction helped establish the film as one of the best of 1956. Dean won an audience award for the best acting of the year as a result of this role.

"Battle Cry" continues in the best gung-ho tradition, but is enjoyable in spite of that attitude. Certain seemingly unrehearsed bits of hand manipulation add authentic touches to the film.

Tonight the Fox ends its run of "Indian Fighter," starring Kirk Douglas. We couldn't be luckier. Co-feature is "Naked Street."

'Eternity' Returns

Another top double bill—"From Here to Eternity" and "The Wild One"—go on the screen at the Heilig Sunday. Burt Lancaster, Deborah Kerr, Donna Reed and Frank Sinatra play in the former, and Marlon Brando can be seen in the latter. Miss Reed and Si-

natra both won academy awards for their roles in "Eternity."

Foreign Students Must Register

Commissioner J. M. Swing of the Immigration and Naturalization service has reminded all foreign students and other noncitizens that they must report their address to the service each January under provisions of the 1952 Immigration and Nationality act.

All students coming under this classification should go to the Eugene post office to fill out an address report in compliance with the requirement. Willful violation of the act could make the noncitizen subject to a fine or deportation.

Address report cards, available at the local post office, should be filled out as soon as possible. To comply with the law the alien must fill out a card and hand it to a post office clerk. No alien should mail his own card.

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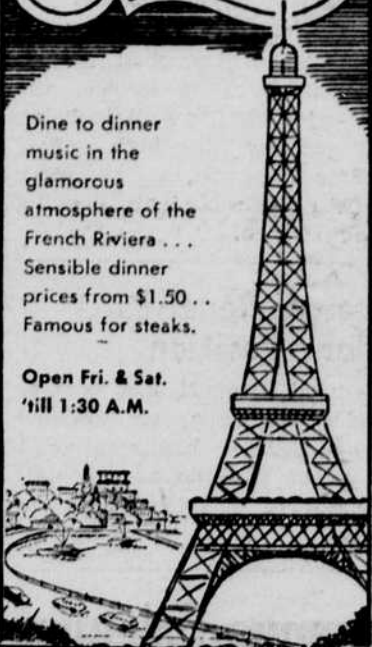
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
