

Huskies Invade Mac Court

Washington Huskies, the enigma of the Coast basketball scene, will do battle with Bill Borchers' Oregon hoop performers tonight as the two clubs get together for their last non-conference contest of the season.

With the tip-off slated for the usual 8 p.m., local fans will have a chance to see the potentially-great but presently-inconsistent Husky five that has managed only a 5-6 record thus far.

Tippy Dye's men were accorded a top ranking by the "men who know" before action got underway in December. Along with UCLA's potent Bruins, the Huskies were tabbed a power to be reckoned with in the new unified PCC campaign.

But Washington found the cramped quarters of the Stanford gym too much to handle, and came out on the short end of 72-55 and 73-68 decisions with the Indians in a surprising pair of season-opening games.

Back on the familiar map of spacious Edmundson Pavillion in Seattle, though, it was a differ-

ent story. Baylor moved into town and was the recipient of inhospitable 71-62 and 80-68 defeats.

Then Washington swung east for three road encounters in the Midwest. A close 74-69 loss to Kansas State opened the tour followed by an 85-77 loss to St. Louis and a 94-73 defeat by Ohio State.

The purple-and-gold turned the tables on its next two Big Ten opponents by taking two home games on consecutive nights during the holidays. Iowa suffered a 76-71 loss and Wisconsin went down by one point, 54-53.

Last weekend, once more in Seattle, the Huskies began to show top form as they walloped Stanford in the first of the conference season, 57-42. But then came a cropper the second night, and the Tribe was the winner, 58-46.

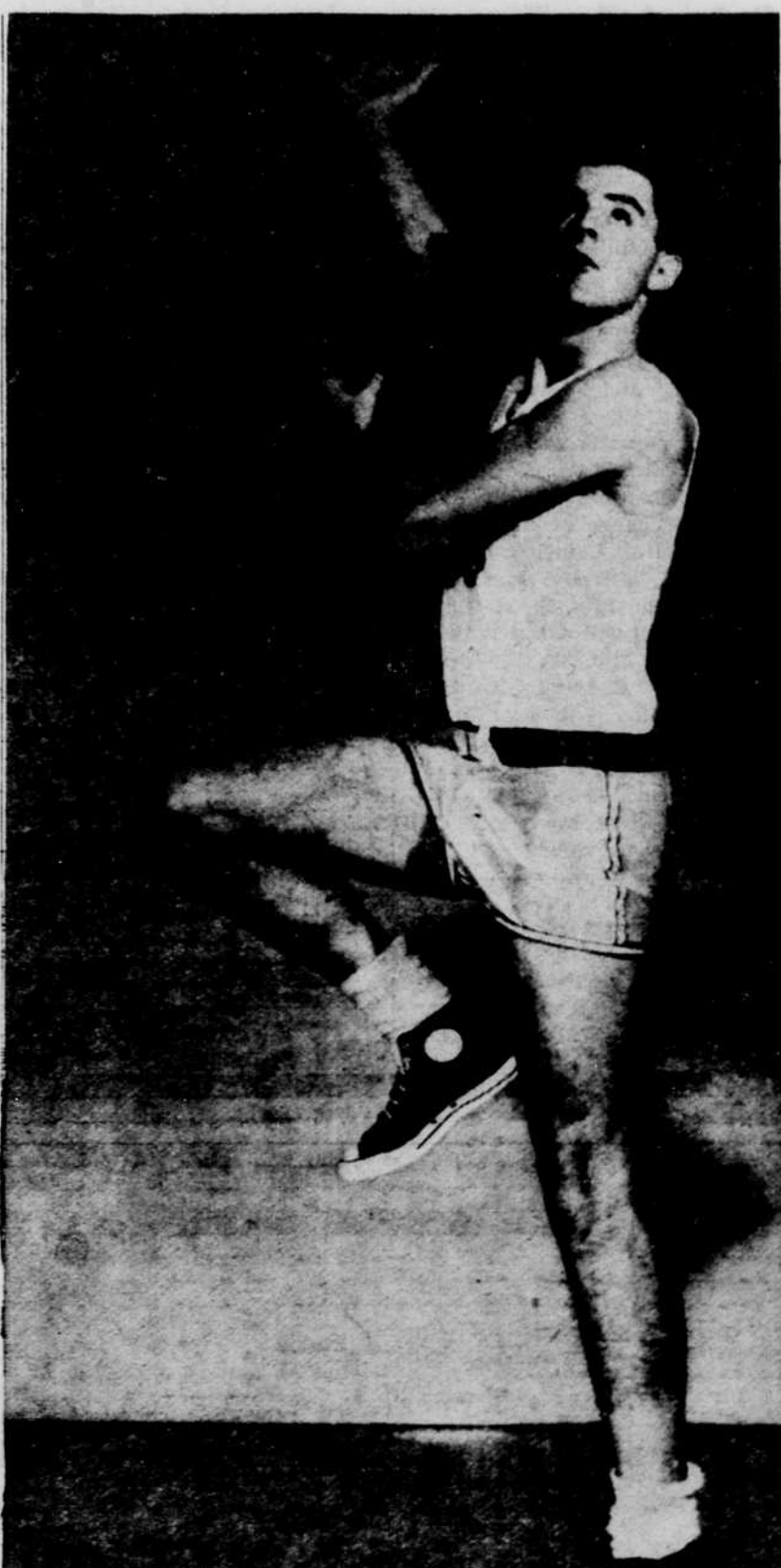
Washington boasts a veteran team, with six two-year lettermen, two one-strippers, and a host of promising sophomore standouts. Lost from the 1954-55 team were center and leading scorer Dean Parson, guards Jerry Johnson and Mike Monroe, and forward Bob Morris.

Leading point producer for the Huskies thus far has been sophomore center Bruno Boin, a 6-8 hook-shot artist who promises to follow in the footsteps of Jack Nichols, Bob Houbregs and Parsons as ace pivotmen for the Seattle school.

Other usual starters have been: 6-6 senior Jim Coshow and 6-4 senior Ron Olsen at forwards, both two-year veterans; 6-0 Doyle Perkins, another third-year man, at one guard; and 6-2 sophomore John Tuft at the other backcourt position.

In reserve are such capable performers as 7-foot Gary Nelson at center, still only a junior; 6-5 Karl Voegtlin at forward, hampered by injuries by a second-team all-ND choice two years hampered by injuries but a second-team guard; and guards Bob Bryan and Ron Patnore, two-year performers.

Oregon is currently on a hot

streak, with wins in their last three games and a 5-4 season's mark. With the 67-61 triumph over Portland on Saturday night, the Ducks racked up their fourth triumph in five starts.

The game will complete the non-conference slate, with California's Golden Bears set to move into Mac Court Friday and Saturday for the league opener. Washington will be taking the weekend off in preparation for the Jan. 20-21 series with Washington State, in Seattle.

Rebounds will probably be a key in the game tonight, with the Husky (6-8 Boin, 6-6 Coshow and 6-4 Olsen) front line tangling with 6-7 Max Anderson, 6-5 Ray Bell and either 6-3 Charley Franklin or 6-3 Bill Moore for Oregon.

The guard starters for the Ducks will likely be the speedy pair who have opened every game for the team, Phil McHugh and Jerry Ross. Ed Bingham will probably be the top reserve here, along with Johnny Lundell and Wimp Hastings.

Anderson continues to lead the

Duck scorers, with 140 points in the nine games played. Ross is next with 117 and McHugh has 84. Bell has 61 and Franklin and Moore 55 each. Ross tops the averages with a .378 mark from the field while Franklin has an .823 foul shot mark.

The team has been outshooting the opposition, having a .329 mark to .311 for the enemy.

The Oregon Frosh will take on the Pacific JV's in a preliminary contest.

Helfand to Question St. Nick's Promoters

NEW YORK (AP)—Julius Helfand, chairman of the New York State Athletic Commission, ordered his counsel to file charges against the Monday night fight promoters at St. Nicholas Arena Monday as he reaped additional rewards for his victory over the Boxing Guild of New York.

Although Helfand approved a Jan. 16 match for St. Nick's, he said he had instructed that charges be pressed against promoters Tex Sullivan and Willie Gilzenberg and their London Sporting Club "on the Maryland situation and other matters."

Helfand said last Thursday he intended to call a hearing to find out if Sullivan and Gilzenberg violated the law forbidding association with known criminals when they sought to transfer their operations from New York to Baltimore, effective Jan. 23.

San Francisco, Dayton Take Ranking Command

San Francisco and Dayton, the two biggies which remained undefeated while the opposition and the law of averages caught up with the other college basketball powers, ran one-two in the national rankings in this week's Associated Press poll of sports writers and broadcasters.

Virtually monopolizing first and second place votes, these two teams ran far out in front in the balloting while North Carolina State skidded to a poor third after losing its first game of this season.

Out of 118 ballots cast this week, 94 first place votes and 16 seconds went to the defensively potent San Francisco Dons, who walked off with the national collegiate championship last season and now are hot on the trail of the record for successive basketball victories.

Dayton's Flyers, like the Dons unbeaten in 11 games this season, drew 12 of the other first place votes and 76 for second. Reduced to points on the usual basis of 10 for each first place vote, nine for second, etc., that came out to 1,145 points for San Francisco and 1,026 for Dayton.

North Carolina State, its winning skein broken by Duke last Saturday, wound up in third place with only 692 points. The Wolfpack drew just one vote for first place, as compared with 22 a week ago. And apparently the only reason why N.C. State didn't drop below third was that most of the other top teams of last week's rankings also had rocky going.

Vanderbilt's Commodores, who won two games without giving particularly impressive performances, clung to fourth place, followed by Kentucky, Duke, Ohio

State, Illinois, North Carolina and Temple.

That listing represented a big change in one week. North Carolina, fifth last week, lost to Wake Forest; George Washington, formerly seventh, was beaten by Maryland and Richmond and wound up in 14th place. Iowa State, No. 8 a week ago, lost to Kansas State and fell to 15th place.

Duke, on the strength of its 68-53 decision over North Carolina State, moved up from 11th place to sixth, but the experts couldn't overlook a loss to giant-killing Wake Forest earlier last week.

Ohio State made a big climb from 10th to seventh place merely by remaining idle for a week after compiling an 8-1 record earlier.

Temple, another of the few remaining unbeaten major college teams, slipped into 10th place just ahead of Holy Cross. But the Owls, while running their string to eighth straight, didn't find Lehigh and Scranton the kind of opposition that makes much impression on the experts.
