Adlai Doubts Ike Farm Message

CHICAGO (AP)—Adlai E. Stevenson said Tuesday that President Eisenhower's farm message "is recognition, at last, that the farmer needs help—at least in an election year."

Stevenson, who seeks the Democratic presidential nomination, issued a statement commenting on the message the President sent to Congress Monday.

Farm, Highway Action Set Soon

WASHINGTON (AP)—Eisenhower administration leaders agreed Tuesday to push for quick congressional action on the farm problem. They talked also of the need to get started on a big highway construction effort.

Democrats, who control Congress, have also shown a desire to get going with farm legislation. Chairman Ellender, (D-La) called his senate agriculture committee to meet with Secretary Benson Thursday morning and with representatives of farm organizations Thursday afternoon. The House Agriculture committee went to work in a preliminary meeting Tuesday.

Federal School Aid

In the meantime, President Eisenhower arranged to send his special message on federal aid to school construction to Congress Thursday morning. His next message will be the important one on the federal budget, next Monday.

Eisenhower called the top Republican leaders of the Senate and House to the White House Tuesday morning on his second full day of work there in his convalescence from his heart attack.

Sen. Knowland said the Republicans want action as soon as possible on the Eisenhower farm message, which went to Congress Monday. He said the feeling of urgency was based on a desire to deal fairly with the farmers as a vital element of the economy, rather than to seek votes for November.

Program Meets Needs

"There was general agreement," he said, "that the message was constructive and, if properly enacted, would meet the agricultural problems of the nation."

A central feature of the pro-

gram received bipartisan support. This was the idea of a soil bank, under which farmers would get cash or commodities from the government for cutting back on unnecessary production.

Democrats, including Senator Humphrey of Minnesota, maintained that the soil bank idea actually originated among them.

However, the biggest objection raised to the Eisenhower program—by some midwestern Republicans as well as many Democrats—was that it wouldn't act quickly enough to help farmers whose prices and income have been steadily dwindling. Rep. Hope (R-Kan), for instance, said the message held no chance of increased farm income for 1956 "when farmers need it so badly."

Sen. Humphrey and some other legislators called for Senate enactment of the high rigid price supports which the House voted for last year, perhaps with some changes.

Flexible Price Supports

The Eisenhower program would supplement the current plan of flexible, rather than rigid, price supports. The administration contends that it was the high supports which led to the accumulation of price-depressing surpluses.

On the matter of highway construction aid, Knowland said the Republican leaders were concerned that Congress hasn't approved a program in the year since Eisenhower submitted his idea, and the highways are now "that much more crowded."

The Eisenhower plan failed last year largely because of Senate objections to its proposal for financing it through a big bond issue. Critics said that this would mean too much money being paid out in interest, rather than on construction.

Proposals to finance it through new taxes on highway users ran into objections from truckers and tire manufacturers, among others, but this idea still appeared to have more support than any bond issue plan.

Howard Morgan Defends Morse

from the direct criticism of the agencies for which he is responsible, he said.

Speaking generally in favor of competition in elections and a disinterested press, Morgan said that on the state level lack of party competition such as has existed in Oregon tends to allow what he termed "second-raters" to run for office in both parties.

The press should maintain "consistent disinterestedness" in all elections, Morgan believes.

Terms Himself a "Liberal"

The Monmouth rancher terms himself a "liberal Democrat," and calls Thomas Jefferson, "to whom the Democratic party can trace itself directly," the best example of that liberal tradition.

Adlai Stevenson is another good example, he feels. Morgan will not actively seek Stevenson's candidacy in the Oregon primary because his policy is not to seek national Democratic candidates for this state's primary elections.

Morgan, who attended the University in 1935 and graduated from Reed college in 1940, was an assistant to national Interstate Commerce Commissioner Eastman and served as a naval officer during the war. He will soon complete four years as chairman of Oregon's state Democratic party.

Members of the admission committee will discuss the general problem of admission to the Medical school and answer questions about the school.

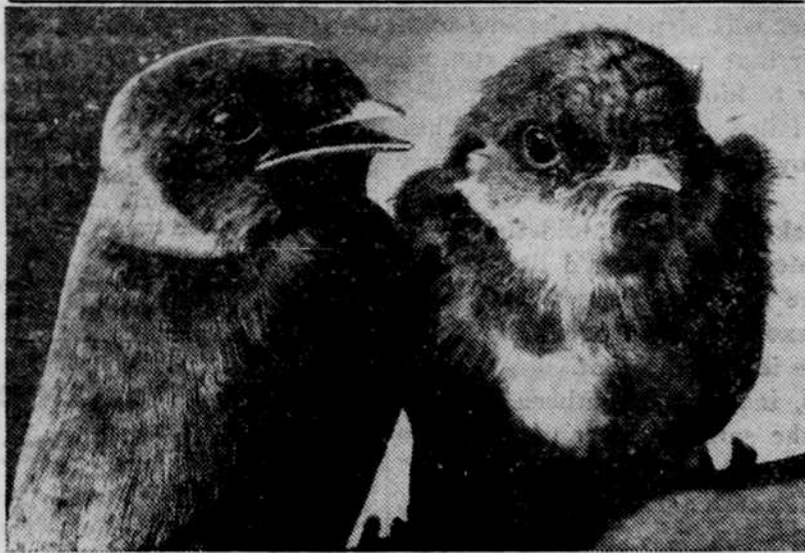
