The ASUO senate Thursday night approved the ASUO Millrace committee's recommendation that a drive be held to raise funds for the restoration of the Millrace and for construction of an anchorage on the 'Race.

Nan Hagedorn and Dave O'Connor were appointed co-chairman of the Crusade for Freedom program. The Senate recommended that the Crusade be held in conjunction with Greek week if Inter-fraternity council and Panhellenic agree.

IFC Favors

Jim Hilands, chairman of the committee reporting to the senate on the Crusade, said Kent Dorwin, IFC president, was in favor of co-ordinating the program with Greek week.

The committee reporting on the pairings of living organizations suggested setting up a standing committee to approve and enforce all pairings. This group, composed of heads of houses, IFC and inter-hall council, would meet in the spring to approve major pairings for the coming year and when necessary during the academic year.

The present group will work with the standing committee arranging the pairings and working out details of organization.

Fraternity Rush Deadline Jan. 21

Men who wish to pledge any of the University's 21 fraternities this term must sign up before Jan. 21.

Kent Dorwin, president of Inter-fraternity council, said. Open rushing will end Jan. 27, the final date for pledging during winter term. A man must register with IFC at Emerald hall at least five days before pledging.

A rush fee of \$5 will be charged unless it has been previously paid.

4,700 Enrollment Seen by School

Enrollment for winter term will probably exceed 4700, according to C. L. Constance, registrar, and this, he said, is an unusually small drop from the fall term final count of 5010.

A normal drop for winter term would be to 4650 or less.

\$1 Fee for Class After Monday

Monday will be the last day to change classes without a \$1 penalty and complications, according to C. L. Constance, registrar.

If a change is made after Monday, the student will have to get the signature of the course instructor and department head.

If a course is dropped after Monday a record will be made of the student's progress in the course until the drop.
