

Business School Gets Scholarships

The University of Oregon school of business administration has received scholarship donations totaling \$1,150, which will be awarded before the end of the current school year.

Junior, senior or graduate students in real estate or insurance fields will be eligible for the scholarships. Minimum amounts of \$100 and maximum amounts of \$250 will be given to students chosen by a committee of business professors and active real estate brokers. To qualify, students must be enrolled in real estate or insurance courses, have a cumulative GPA of at least 2.5 and a "B" average in real estate courses taken.

Knowland Waiting Ike's Decision

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Knowland (R-Calif.) said Sunday night he will wait "patiently" until Feb. 15 for President Eisenhower to decide whether to seek reelection before saying anything about his own hopes for the Republican presidential nomination.

Knowland refused to say what he would do if the President doesn't announce his intentions by Feb. 15. Pressed by questioners on a radio-TV show NBC-Meet the Press, he said, "We'll cross that bridge when we come to it."

The Senate Republican leader's public statement that he would wait until mid-February for Eisenhower's decision indicated a change in his views. Knowland's associates have reported privately that he was determined to get into the nomination race within 10 days unless Eisenhower unexpectedly announced within that period he will run.

Ike Didn't Voice Stand on Attacks, Says Army Chief

WASHINGTON (AP)—Army Secretary Wilber Brucker said President Eisenhower "at no time has said to anybody what his decision will be" on whether he would consider an attack on Quemoy and the Matsus an attack on Formosa.

Brucker added that his understanding was that Eisenhower's decision would "be made at the time" of such an attack.

His statement was made on a television program, ABC's "College Press Conference," after questions concerning a Life Magazine article quoting Secretary of State Dulles.

The magazine article said "Dulles has never doubted . . . that Eisenhower would have regarded an attack on Quemoy and the Matsus as an attack on Formosa." A State Department spokesman has quoted Dulles as vouching for the general accuracy of statements attributed to him in the article.

The implication was drawn by many that, in Dulles' opinion, the President had already made a decision, and there have been reverberations in Congress and abroad over this and other statements in the article.

Detroit Machinery Rolling Once Again

DETROIT (AP)—Printing machinery—except for the presses—hummed Sunday night in Detroit's three metropolitan daily newspapers for the first time in 46 days. And whirring presses Monday are expected to write finis to a strike-shutdown that began Dec. 1.

Members of the seventh of eight unions involved ratified a new contract Sunday. The eighth gave what members conceded was tantamount to approval through its stewards.

The afternoon Times and News expect to publish Monday and the Morning Free Press readied itself for publication Tuesday.

The three dailies, which employ 4,600 and have a circulation of around 1,300,000, closed Dec. 1 when stereotypers walked out following expiration of their contract at midnight Nov. 30. Other craft unions respected stereotypers picketlines, and later the printers and mailers went on strike.
