

Major General Ennis Tours Oregon; Meets with UO ROTC Members

Major General Riley F. Ennis, Deputy Commanding General of the 6th Army, will visit here Thursday to take a brief look at the University ROTC detachment. Gen. Ennis, on tour of Oregon military reserve installations, arrived in Portland Monday. While on campus, Gen. Ennis will confer with University officials and then inspect an honor guard composed of ROTC drill team members at about 1:15 p.m. The ceremony will be held in front of the ROTC supply room. Gen. Ennis will also speak to senior, MS IV cadets during his stay here. Lt. Col. R. D. Evans, professor of military science and

tactics, announced Monday. He added that the general would probably leave the campus around 3 p.m. Gen. Ennis will be accompanied on his trip by Col. Willard B. Carlock, chief of the Oregon Military District. After his arrival in Portland yesterday, Gen. Ennis conferred with prominent military and civilian officials. Today, he is slated to call on Gov. Paul Patterson and Maj. Gen. Thomas E. Rilea, state adjutant general for the Oregon National Guard. The next day, Wednesday, the general will confer with A. L. Strand, president of Oregon State college, at Corvallis. Gen. Ennis' arrival here Thursday will mark his first official visit to Oregon since assuming his new duties last October. It was at that time that he replaced Maj. Gen. William F. Dean, the Korean War hero who recently retired from the army. Gen. Ennis began his army career during World War I. In 1939 he was graduated from Army War college. In 1940, he went abroad as a military observer, visiting such spots as London, Cairo, and Singapore. In 1944, Gen. Ennis, at that time a colonel, became commander of Combat Command A, 12th Armored Division at Camp Berkeley, Texas. That same year he was promoted to Brigadier General on

the night before the division left for the European theatre of operations. After his return to the U.S. in October of 1945, he became director of intelligence for the military intelligence service in Washington, D. C. Then, after serving as Military Attache at Ottawa, Canada, he was appointed Chief of the Armored Inspectorate in the Office of the Chief, Army Field Forces at Fort Monroe, Va., in 1950. In May 1951, Gen. Ennis was named Assistant Chief of Staff for Intelligence for the Far East Command and Supreme Commander, Allied Powers at Tokyo, Japan. Upon formation of a joint headquarters in Japan in the early part of 1953 he was named Assistant Chief of Staff of the Far East Command and United Nations Command.

Real Estate Agents Enroll For Appraisal Institute

An enrollment of 40 real estate agents, brokers, and salesmen registered yesterday for the first day of a two-week institute entitled "Real Estate Appraisal II." Mrs. Ellen Bergis of Oswego is the only woman to enroll. As the name implies, the class is an advanced course in real estate appraising. Students will be required to make two practice appraisals. All must appraise a single-family residence and either an apartment building or a store building. Morning sessions will consist of lectures by instructors David L. Montoona, M.A.I. of Cape Vincent, N.Y., and William W. Abellmann, M.A.I. of Glendale, Calif. Afternoons will be devoted to group study on the practice appraisal problems. Trips will be made to buildings under appraisal, and discussions will be made. For this purpose, the institute

has been divided into four groups. Group leaders are Joseph Dent, Roseberg; Joseph Shelley, Portland; Harold McMillan, Silverton; and Gerald Harrington, Portland. Designed for Oregon realtors who will receive credit toward an M.A.I. designation upon successful completion of the course, Real Estate Appraisal II is sponsored by the school of business administration with the American Institute of Real Estate appraisers, the Oregon Real Estate boards, and the Oregon Real Estate department.

Koenig Discusses Franklin, Science

To commemorate Benjamin Franklin's 250th birthday on Jan. 17, Frederick O. Koenig, professor of chemistry at Stanford University, will speak on "Benjamin Franklin and Science" Thursday evening at 8 p.m. in the Dad's lounge.

Presently engaged in writing a book on electro-chemical thermodynamics, Koenig has been at Stanford since 1931. He received his bachelor's degree from Harvard in 1920, and his doctor's degree in physical chemistry from the University of Munich, on a National Research fellowship from the University of California in 1930. His main fields of study have been thermodynamics, the history of science and science and humanities.

Resignation Due to Administration Change

A former University assistant professor of architecture who quit his job two weeks ago issued a statement to the Emerald Monday blaming a recent change in administration for his resignation. Edmond M. MacCollin said in a written statement that "My resignation is in protest of the recent change in administration with the resulting change in Professor Hayden's effective teaching status, and of the . . . manner by which this was accomplished."

W. S. Hayden, a professor of architecture, until recently held the position of Director of Curriculum in Architecture. His job was abolished when the job of Chairman of Architecture, Land-

scape Architecture, and Interior Design was created and filled by F. A. Cuthbert, professor of architecture. Dean Sidney W. Little and other school officials have called the shift only a matter of operational procedure. MacCollin came to the University on a part-time basis during the 1950-51 school year, and then returned in 1952 after a year's absence. He submitted his resignation Jan. 3 in a letter to University President O. Meredith Wilson.
