The Feb. 2 speaker will be Carroll O'Rourke, account executive of Cole and Weber, a Portland advertising agency. On Feb. 16, the president of the Wall Street Journal, Bernard Kilgore, will be here. He will give the annual Eric W. Allen Memorial address. The March 1 journalism guest will be Paul Walden of The Dalles. Walden is manager of radio station KODL and is president of the Oregon State Broadcasters Assn.
