

Students Decide To Reorganize

The International Relations club will be reorganized following a decision made by forty students Wednesday at a meeting held in the Student Union.

The meeting was called to ascertain student interest in such a club, and to make plans for the Model United Nations to be held at OSC April 4 to 7.

Calvin Billeter, selected as temporary chairman, presided at the meeting. It was decided to make the Model UN a function of the International Relations club.

Corvallis Meeting

Chuck Creamer reported on the meeting he attended in Corvallis last week dealing with the Model UN. Oregon will send fifteen students who will participate as delegates from Nationalist China.

Delegates will support Nationalist China's view, but will be allowed some flexibility in voting. Creamer also pointed out that a second country had been applied for which, if received, would give Oregon a chance to send 30 delegates.

C. P. Schleicher, professor of political science, and William Brooks reported on the meeting they attended at Reed college in Portland Tuesday, where ideas on International Relations clubs were interchanged.

Inter-coordinating Council

An inter-coordinating council composed of delegates from each of the schools in this region was selected at this meeting in Portland. The council will look into the advisability of a spring conference in this region and explore the possibilities of a news bulletin composed of news from the various clubs as an avenue for

general interchange of ideas between clubs.

A nominating committee under the chairmanship of Lon Bryant was selected to choose candidates for International Relations club officers. A constitution committee was selected with Janet Bellin as chairman. Schleicher will act as adviser to the committee. Creamer was nominated as temporary chairman of the Model UN committee.

Application blanks for students interested in being delegates to the Model UN will be available in the political science office Friday afternoon. Deadline for applications is Wednesday, when they may be turned in to the political science office or at the International club meeting at 7 p.m. in 111 Student Union.

Billeter announced that the meeting will be short because of the R.E. week activities.

Summer School Open in Britain

Kenneth Holland, president of the Institute of International Education, has announced the opening of British universities to American students during the summer of 1956. Applications must be sent to the Institute, 1 East 67th St., New York 21, N.Y., by March 26, 1956.

A limited number of scholarships will be offered to American students. Six-week courses will be offered at Oxford, Stratford-on-Avon, University of London, and Edinburgh. Courses are planned to serve the needs of post-graduate students, but highly qualified undergraduates in their junior or senior years will be accepted.

U.S. Civil Service Announces Tests

Examinations for several government openings in the Washington, D.C., area have been announced by the United States Civil Service commission. Applicants must file before Feb. 7, for information concerning date and place of examination.

Openings include equipment specialist, editorial clerk and personnel clerk, student trainee in agriculture, actuary, and dental officer. Salaries vary from \$2,960 to \$11,610 a year.

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Aliens Must File Address Report

All University of Oregon students who are not citizens of the United States are reminded by John W. Wilson, of the Immigration and Naturalization service, that only two weeks remain during which they must file their annual report of address as required by law. The report form is available at the Eugene post office.

The Immigration office says that all aliens, except those in United Nations, must file such a report in January of each year. An estimated 4,000 aliens in Oregon have already complied with the law. Failure to comply can mean fine, imprisonment, and/or deportation in the case of willful violations.
