Pinks, Greens, Yellows Lead Color Parade in Skiing Outfits

Making a bright splash across the snow bound slopes, color will enter the skiing world this winter. Pace setters all over the country have been slowly retiring their black and navy blue uniforms to substitute those of bright pink, emerald green, and even mustard yellow making one of the biggest changes in ski fashions its followers have seen.

Worn in colors to match their parkas, slacks will be cut fuller this year but will still have the look of knifelike slimness and the black shiny boots will be fastened with costume matched laces.

At the more exclusive resorts, the very brave will appear in parkas of flowered silk-like nylon; but for the practical coeds,

designers and manufacturers are featuring a poplin or nylon parka in the new colors that can be worn either belted or tucked in. For convenience's sake they have a hidden zippered pocket for ski glasses under a decorative flap.

Gloves of leather or fur will also replace the wool and leather combinations of previous years. Popular with skiers will be lamb, tiger, polar dog skin, and similar materials.

To conceal the necessities of skiing life — lipstick and tow tickets — zippered pockets have been tucked into the cuffs of these gloves. For the extra warmth needed silk nun's gloves

in black and white can be worn under the fur ones this season to give an added warmth to snow cooled hands.

Women Apply For Training

College senior women may now apply for two national scholarships which are again being offered by the Katharine Gibbs Secretarial school of New York. Each scholarship consists of full tuition for the secretarial training course, plus an additional cash award of \$500, totaling \$1,185. Full information may be obtained from the college placement bureau at the University of Oregon.

Winners, who will be recommended by the applicant's university, will be chosen by the Scholarship committee on the basis of college academic record, personal and character qualifications, financial need, and potentialities for success in business.

Winners may select any one of the four Gibbs schools for their training — Boston, New York, Montclair, and Providence.

Tri Delta Gives Scholarship

The annual Tri Delta general scholarship fund competition will take place from now until February 25.

Any woman student enrolled at the University of Oregon is eligible to apply. Applicants will be judged not only as to their qualifications as good students but also on the promise they show of being valuable citizens in their future communities.

The Delta Delta Delta Awards committee will judge the merits of each applicant and successful candidate will be notified by May 15. Scholarships will be forwarded to them at the beginning of the term for which they are granted.

The amount of the awards on any one campus will not exceed \$200.00. Application blanks are available at the dean of women's office in Emerald hall.
