

General Ennis Impressed With UO ROTC Cadets

"Very favorable" was the comment of Maj. Gen. Riley F. Ennis Thursday, as he made a brief visit to the University and its Army ROTC detachment, Lt. Col. R. D. Evens said Thursday.

Gen. Ennis, Deputy Commanding General of the 6th Army, is on tour of Oregon military reserve installations.

Col. Evens, professor of military science and tactics, concluded that Gen. Ennis was well pleased with what he saw in his day-long tour.

Gen. Ennis was "very highly pleased with what he saw of the school representatives" and "very favorably impressed with the cadets," Col. Evens said.

He added that the general told the honor guard he inspected that it was "fine appearing" and had done just as well of any he had ever seen.

Gen. Ennis conferred with several University officials and representatives of the various other armed services during lunch.

He talked briefly with senior MS IV students, primarily stressing the role that ROTC graduates would play in the country's future, Col. Evens said.

The general inspected an honor guard, made up of ROTC drill team members, early in the afternoon. The ceremony was held on a blocked-off portion of 15th street, in front of the ROTC supply room.

Gen. Ennis was accompanied on his trip by Col. Willard B. Carlock, chief of the Oregon Military District.

It was the general's first official visit to Oregon since assuming his new duties last October. Previously, the post had belonged to Maj. Gen. William F. Dean,

who recently retired from the army.

Gen. Ennis has held many positions in the army, among them Assistant Chief of Staff for Intelligence for the Far East Command and Supreme Commander, Allied Powers at Tokyo, Japan; and Assistant Chief of Staff of the Far East Command and United Nations Command.

He began his army career during World War I.

Bisno to Attend Buffalo Confab

Herbert Bisno, assistant professor of sociology, will leave Monday for Buffalo, N.Y., scene of the annual national meeting of the Council on Social Work Education, Jan. 25-28.

"How Social Will Social Work Be: The Status Dilemma of Professional Social Work" has been selected as the title of a paper which Bisno has completed and will present to the conference.

Bisno will be chairman of the workshop on "The Teaching of Social Philosophy and Social Responsibility in the Undergraduate Program as a Basis for Graduate Study and Professional Practice."

The Council on Social Work Education is the national accrediting and standard-setting organization in the field. Member-organizations include graduate schools of social work, social agencies, and some undergraduate departments of sociology and social work, according to Bisno.

BA Insurance Seminar Open to UO Students

The forthcoming insurance seminar will be open to University students, it was announced Thursday by M. R. Greene, associate professor of business administration and director of education for the 1956 Mid-winter Campus Seminar to be held Jan. 26-28 in Commonwealth hall.

According to Greene, the seminar registration limit of 100 local and general insurance agents has been reached, but seminar sessions and topics will be announced for the benefit of University students who wish to participate.

Lectures and discussions will be held on such topics as reinsurance, rating, company underwriting practices, determining the loss, and others.

Greene will address the seminar on "Insurance as a Profession."

Directors for the seminar include: David Warwick, managing director; Robert Deardorf, director of faculty; Russell Mar-

tini, director of public relations; William Rau, director of student affairs; Alan Tebb, director of administration; and Greene.

Ray Knapp, chairman of the committee on education and professional standards for the Oregon Association of Insurance Agents, will preside. Sponsorship will be provided by the school of business administration; the Institute of Oregon Underwriters, a subdivision of the Oregon Association of Insurance Agents; the Oregon Insurance Rating Bureau; and the Oregon Fire Underwriters association.
