Staples Writes Special Article

Lloyd W. Staples, professor of geology is the author of an article, "X-ray Investigation of Ferrierite, A Zeolite," appearing in The American Mineralogist.

This volume of the journal of the Mineralogical Society of America was dedicated to Edward H. Kraus of the University of Michigan, called one of the world's foremost crystallographers and mineralogists, on his 80th birthday.

Staples, who studied under Kraus at Michigan, was invited to contribute to this special volume, along with other students and colleagues of Kraus.

X-ray investigations described in Staples' article were part of a research project carried out both at the University and at the University of California at Berkeley.

Language Dept. Issues Newsletter

First issues of the new quarterly newsletter, "Spectrum," will be sent to all Oregon foreign language teachers next month. A second issue is planned for February.

At an organizational meeting of the publication's editorial board, David M. Dougherty, head of the foreign language department, was elected chairman. "Spectrum" will be financially supported by the foreign language department of the Oregon Educational association.

The purpose of the newsletter is to "keep foreign language teachers informed of recent developments in teaching at all levels, according to Dougherty. It will give attention particularly to new techniques in teaching, the growing program of foreign languages in elementary schools, and teaching of languages by radio and television.

Writing Contest Open to Students

Students wishing to compete in the Peter Pauper press essay contest will have until Feb. 1 to notify Miss Bernice Rice, browsing room librarian, of their intention.

Any graduate student enrolled in the University for a full course of study is eligible to compete. Winners will be presented with books of their own selection.

Rules for the contest are as follows: 1: only one essay may be submitted by a contestant; 2: essays must not exceed 2000 words; 3: they should be legibly written in ink or preferably typewritten, double-spaced, have wide margins and be on one side of the paper, 8½ by 11 inches in size.

The student's name and campus address should be on the essay, and the sheets should be numbered consecutively and fastened securely together.

Give Sources

Direct quotation must be included in quotation marks, and due credit given to sources of reference. Books referred to in the essay must have been read by the contestant during the current school year.

Essays are to be submitted to

Carl W. Hintz, University librarian, or to Miss Rice, in the browsing room, by May 1.

Groups of books will be presented to the winners. A first prize of ten books will be given, while the second place winner will receive five books. The selections will be chosen by the winners from the Peter Pauper press "Collector's Edition's."

Topics Suggested

Suggested topics for the essay are "Great Editions of Great Books," "The Nature of a Classic," "The Collecting of a Student's Library," "What the Classics Mean to Me," or "Reading for Leisure Moments."

Judges of the contest will be the University librarian and two members of the University faculty, who are to be appointed by the librarian.

Prizes will be awarded during Junior Weekend.
