Chataway Dubious Over Olympic Try

LONDON (AP)—Chris Chataway, great British distance runner, said Tuesday he may not be able to take part in the 1956 Olympics at Melbourne, Australia, because of lack of training time.

Chataway, a four minute miler and former holder of the world's three mile mark, now is a commentator for British commercial television.

He told newsmen:

"Sometimes I am able to train three times a week, then I may not be able to do any more for a fortnight.

"I am not really finding the time for training that I did before and at the moment I am a little bit doubtful whether I shall be able to go to Melbourne."

Robbie, Mantle Ink '56 Contracts

NEW YORK (AP)—A couple of big baseball names, Jackie Robinson of the Brooklyn Dodgers and Micky Mantle of the New York Yankees, signed their 1956 contracts Tuesday after having rejected their original offers.

Mantle, whose star is still rising, compromised for a \$30,000 salary after having turned down an offer of some \$2,500 less several days ago. Asked whether he got what he wanted, the 24-year-old centerfielder, who is still not over the effects of a tonsilectomy, replied wanly:

"I'm well satisfied."

Robinson, in the twilight of a brilliant career, agreed to a cut which reduced his 1955 salary to an estimated \$33,000. He reportedly earned \$37,500 last year, which was \$2,000 under his peak salary of \$39,500 in 1954.

Continued Injuries Haunt Ski Trials

CORTINA D'AMPEZZO, Italy (AP)—The injury-plagued 1956 winter Olympics chalked up six more accidents Tuesday, raising the hospital list to more than 30, while California's Squaw Valley battled to save the 1960 games.

The Squaw Valley bid, threatened by strong pressure from Innsbruck, Austria, took on a brighter aspect with unofficial assurance from high International Olympic committee quarters that California could clinch the 1960 event by raising an additional four million dollars.

UO Swim Team Picks up Ribbons

Oregon's swim team warmed up for their opening conference meet against Washington February 4 by picking up ribbons in the Washington state AAU meet in Vancouver Saturday and Sunday.

Duck Coach John Borchardt called the performance "commendable, considering the time they have been working out," as Bob Hays, Jerry Froebe, Steve Hall, Billy Warner, and the free-style relay team all won honors.

Hays turned in the top performance, placing second in the 100-yard breast stroke and third in the butterfly event. Froebe splashed to a third in the 100-yard free-style and a fourth in the 220 free.

Warner, against exceptional competition, finished third in diving, and Hall took third in the 100 breast stroke. The relay team of Froebe, Yoji Matsushima, Don Jacklin, and Bill Goodwin finished third in the finals.

Beck, Naulls Top Coast Statistics

Larry Beck of Washington State has assumed the scoring lead in the Pacific Coast Conference basketball race but UCLA's Morris Taft still has the best average per game, figures from the PCC Commissioner's office revealed today.

Beck has scored 119 points in Washington State's first six games on 38 field goals and 43 free throws, and has averaged 19.8 points per game. Taft, who ranks only third in total scoring with 105 points, has a 26.3 game average but has played in only four games. He has connected on 42 field goals and 21 free throws.

Second in total scoring is Dave Gambee of Oregon State with 108 points. Willie Naulls, UCLA, has 92 for fourth place followed by Max Anderson, Oregon, 86. Others in the top scoring include Bill Bond, Stanford, 84; Jack Mitchell, Idaho, and George Selleck, Stanford, 78; Jay Buhler, Idaho, 72, and Barry Brown, Stanford, 63.

Naulls and Anderson also have averaged better than 20 points per game—Naulls 23.0 and Anderson 21.5.

Taft is the top marksman in shooting from the floor with 54.5 per cent on 42 field goals in 77 attempts. Others at 50 per cent or better include Carroll Adams, UCLA 53.3 per cent; Ray Bell, Oregon, 52.8 per cent; Jerry Ross, Oregon, 51.5 per cent; and Gary Van Galder, Stanford, and Jim Kaufman, Southern California, 50 per cent.

Bill Bauscher of Idaho retains his leadership from the free throw line, even though his consecutive string was broken last weekend. His percentage is 91.3 per cent on 21 points in 23 attempts. Bauscher sank his last five attempts of the 1955 season and his first 20 of this season for an unbroken string of 25 straight for a new Conference record. The old mark of 21 straight was set up by Jay Dean, Oregon State in 1954.

Naulls is the top rebounder with 71 rebounds out of a total of 363 opportunities for 19.6 per cent. Next in line are Jim Coshow, Washington, 16.9 per cent, and Anderson 15.7 per cent.
