Cleric Panel Holds Talk

Three theologians on campus for the Parliament of World Religions discussed the topic: "What is the attitude of your religion toward Communism" at a panel Thursday afternoon.

Rabbi Saul White represented the Jewish point of view, Rev. Leonidas Contos spoke from the Greek Orthodox standpoint, and Mr. A. R. Sahu Khan discussed the topic as a representative of the Moslem faith.

Rabbi White, in his opening remarks, stated that Judaism considers history as judgement, and that Communism is a judgement on the west. He said that the west preaches the brotherhood of man but acts against this at every opportunity. "Crisis is not only critical times," he said, "it is also judgement."

Communitistic Origins

Mr. Contos, speaking from the standpoint of the Greek Orthodox church, told the group that his church had its origin in a purely Communitistic atmosphere, as it was necessary if the church was to grow. He said that the Communist menace had been fought within Greece for four or five years since World War II, but that now Greece was rid of it.

Communism tries to make the state supreme, Mr. Contos said, and at the same time to make the people insignificant. "We try to keep the dignity of the human soul from being smothered by the state," he said.

Mr. Kahn said that in the Islam religion, man carries his religion with him at all times. Man's conscience tells him what is right and wrong. "There is no division of church and state," he said, "as it is a way of life covering all ways of existence."

Control Human Spirit

He said that Communism attempt to control the human spirit to the very depths. As discipline for the human spirit, it clashes with faith. It sets up a kingdom of God on earth without a God.

The doctrine of Communism is world conquest through ruthless methods, Mr. Kahn said. "They talk of peace, but they think in terms of revolt and war." "They stupefy opponents so that in time they can eat them up," he said. "The attitude of my religion, Islam, is absolutely against it."

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Catholic Cleric Tells of His Church

The three sections of the Roman Catholic church include the Church triumphant, made up of those people who have attained heaven, the suffering souls in purgatory, who will eventually gain heaven, and the church militant, who are engaged in the combat of life.

The Rev. Archibald McDowell, professor of philosophy and religion at Portland university, spoke to a Religious Emphasis Week crowd Thursday afternoon on "Man and God in Roman Catholic Christianity."

Although the word "Catholic" is not found in the Bible, Father McDowell said Christ established a "universal church" to teach all nations and while he did not give it a name it has come to be called Catholic, meaning universal. The name Catholic became widely used by the third century A.D. The prefix Roman was added in the 16th century to distinguish between the Anglo Catholics, the Greek Catholic, and the Roman Catholic. The complete name of the Church, however, is the Holy Catholic Apostolic Roman church. The Roman simply designates the place of the government of the church.

Intolerance Explained

Catholicism never fused with any other religious elements, Father McDowell commented. Because it has been rigidly uncompromising the Catholic church has gained the reputation of intolerance.

A mark of the Catholic church is that we must observe all

things in a golden mean. Father McDowell commented that certain seeming contradictions such as "Christ is God yet Man," and "God is One yet Three," are not supposed to be explained. "Symbolism is the inseparable companion of religion."

Our love of God is true religion, he commented, and true religion must be mystical. The confirmation of religion is found in paradoxes such as it is both dogmatic and indulgent.

Split from Church Necessary

Father McDowell explained heresy, the division from the Church, as something necessary so that we would seek the truth of religion. Had there been no split, people would not have bothered to seek the truth and so actually the split was helpful to the Church.

In concluding his speech, Father McDowell pointed out that all would do well to review the first four centuries and study the doctrines of the eastern churches to see the close relationships to modern Christianity.

Panel to Discuss Religious Problems

"Can a Revitalized Christianity Effectively Meet the Problems of a World in Revolution?" This is the topic of a panel discussion Sunday evening at 8 in the Dads' Lounge at the Student Union.

The panel, made up of U of O students who were delegates to the Student Volunteer Movement Ecumenical Conference held at Athens, Ohio, over Christmas vacation, will bring out many of the ideas expressed at the conference.

Representing several of the various religious student centers on campus, the panel consists of Marilyn Fullerton, Julianne Jensen, Miriam Vaaler, Ron Christensen, Bertram Collins, Wynn Dahlgren and Walter York. An open invitation is extended to the public.
