Russians Lead Winter Games

CORTINA D'AMPEZZO, Italy (AP)—The precision figure skating of world champion Hayes Alan Jenkins bolstered America's sagging morale in the Winter Olympic Games Sunday but Russia fattened its team lead with a third gold medal and a 21-year-old Austrian plumber streaked to victory in the men's giant slalom ski race.

At the end of the third day, with seven of the 24 championships decided, the rugged Soviet athletes held a total of 60 points in the unofficial team standings with Austria closest at 29. The United States, still medal-less, was tied with Switzerland for seventh place with 6½ points.

The Yanks came within sight of their first championship when the 22-year-old Jenkins of Colorado Springs, Colo., grabbed a commanding lead in the compulsory figure phase of the men's figure skating competition, with only two teammates threatening him.

In second place was Ronald Robertson, 18-year-old red-haired whiz from Long Beach, Calif., followed by Hayes' kid brother, David. The compulsory figure routines, in which the skaters follow fixed designs, count 60 per cent in the scoring while the free skating, scheduled Wednesday, counts 40 per cent.

Boris Schilkov, a wiry 28-year-old construction engineer, gave Russia its third championship of the games when he sped to triumph in the 5000 meter 3 miles, 188 yards speed skating test on the glazed, lightning fast track at Misurina, setting a new Olympic record of 7 minutes, 48.7 seconds.

Tony Sailer, a handsome young Austrian who resembles movie star Tyrone Power, gave a dazzling exhibition of speed and skill

in capturing the giant slalom race in 3 minutes, 1.1 seconds.

Americans failed to place in both of these championships. Their best was 17th in the speed race, and 13th in the giant slalom.

The American picture was further darkened when Betsy Snite, a 17-year-old skier from Norwich, Vt., twisted her left knee in practice and had to pull out of Monday's women's special slalom. Team officials said the injury did not appear serious and she may be able to compete in the women's downhill Wednesday.

Also a four-man bobsled piloted by the veteran Jim Bickford of Saranac Lake, N.Y., overturned on the icy Mt. Tofana slide but the crew luckily emerged unhurt. The sled required some repairs.

Jimmy Demaret Takes Thunderbird with 269

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (AP)—Veteran Jimmy Demaret knocked out a pair of dramatic birdies on the back nine Sunday that spelled defeat for Gary Middlecoff and gave the jaunty fashion plate from Texas victory in the \$15,000 Thunderbird Invitational Golf Tournament.

Trailing going into the final round, and still one shot behind Middlecoff passing the 63rd hole, Demaret wound up with a two-under-par 69 and a 72-hole score of 269.

A disappointed Middlecoff made a gallant bid to recoup the setback, almost bagging an eagle two on the 17th and getting a birdie, but he couldn't catch the 43-year-old Demaret.

Middlecoff finished with a par 71 and total of 270, with Jimmy collecting the \$2000 top money and Middlecoff \$1000.

Jimmy's score was 15 strokes under par for the distance and established a new tournament record by one stroke.

Gene Littler, with a remarkable comeback for a man who soared to a 76 in the second round, shot a nifty 66 for a total of 277 and third place money of \$750.

Julius Boros, third to Middlecoff and Demaret starting out this noon over the 6,843-yard, par 36-35-71 Thunderbird Country Club, drifted back with a 73 and a tie at 278 with slender Gardner Dickinson, Jr., of Panama City Beach, Fla. The latter had a 70.

The 279 bracket included Mike Souchak, with a 68; Bud Holscher, 68; Tommy Bolt, 69; Fred Hawkins, 70, and Arnold Palmer, 67.

Demaret's performance was something like the job he did in 1953 when he slapped out a birdie on the 17th green and followed with an eagle on the 18th and beat out the great Ben Hogan for the Thunderbird laurels.

Thus Demaret, who started out with a brilliant 64 in the first round, and followed with a 69 and a 67, picked up the marbles and pointed toward the next tournament next week at Phoenix, Ariz.

Walter Burkemo, with a 65, was the low scorer for the round, which gave him 280 and a tie with Doug Ford, 69; Billy Maxwell, 69, and Al Balding, 68.

National Open champion Jack Fleck wound up a disappointing performance with a 75 for 295.

Team alertness, razor-sharp passing and the shooting accuracy of George Selleck, Barry Brown and Bill Bond enabled the Stanford Indians to easily sweep a two game series from the hapless Oregon Ducks at Stanford Pavilion.

The fast and shifty Cardinal quintet pulled away in the second half of both contests to win 74-55 Friday night and 73-60 before a Saturday afternoon television audience.

The Indians are now 6-2 in the PCC but didn't improve upon their fourth position as

scored 32 points, mostly on follow-ups and driving lay-ins. Franklin was a rebounding power on the defensive boards, clearing 20 Saturday afternoon.

Coach Bill Borchert was also pleased with the aggressive play of sophomore center Hal Duffy, who started the second game.

Stanford has now won nine straight at home and possesses a commendable 13-2 record for all games. Oregon has dropped four of their last five and is 8-8 on the season.

Stanford 75--Oregon 55

A cheering, partisan crowd of 3,000 jammed the rafters of the Stanford Pavilion Friday night and were rewarded with a decisive victory by the home team.

The game was even after 12 minutes. Then Oregon pulled into a 17-13 lead. But Brown made both free throws after being fouled by Captain Phil McHugh and Stanford took an 18-17 edge. Then Coach Borchert pulled McHugh, who had three personals, and the Indians immediately moved away.

The Cardinal five reeled off 11 points to two for the Ducks, but Bell and Franklin began hitting for Oregon. The score was 34-28, Stanford, at the half.

The Indians, led by the diminutive Selleck, staged a second half surge and led 45-32 after five

minutes had elapsed. The Webfoots were never within ten points after that.

Both teams used a screening offense with quick passing for the "good shot" and Stanford hit 43 per cent from the field to Oregon's 40 per cent. The aggressive Stanford man-for-man defense forced the Ducks into numerous errors. Oregon, second in the PCC in free throw percentage, could hit only 11 of 24 for 45.8 per cent.

Bill Bond led all scorers with

20 points, followed by Barry Brown with 17 and Selleck's 14. Jerry Ross, Duck guard, connected for 15, mostly on jump shots and Charlie Franklin hit 14 tallies while rebounding well. Phil McHugh turned his ankle slightly in the second half.

Stanford 73--Oregon 60

Coach Bill Borchert shook up his starting quintet and the Ducks employed a tight zone defense to befuddle the Palo Altoans most of the first half.

Hal Duffy and Bill Moore replaced Bell and Anderson and Oregon forced the Indians to take bad long shots while clearing the defensive board well. Anderson scored his first field goal of the series with the count knotted at 22-22.

The score was tied 12 times in the first half and Oregon led 26-22 with 17 minutes gone when George Selleck hit four long jump shots in a row and Stanford left the court at half time breather with a 32-28 lead.

Oregon zone as he hit another long one and made two beautiful passes to Brown for lay-ins on an interception and a fast break. The Indians jumped off to a 39-29 lead and won going away.

The Webfoots were forced out of their zone into a man-for-man by Selleck's accuracy, and the Cardinals had no trouble making their screening offense work. Center Barry Brown hit 15 points on drives in the second half surge.

Stanford used their half-court press after 10 minutes, but Anderson and Bell came in and Ross and McHugh handled it adequately. The Big Red used a tough, aggressive man-for-man defense to force the Ducks into many passing and ball-handling errors.

Selleck hit 11 of 22 from the field to lead scoring with 23 markers. Brown connected for 17 points and Coach Howie Dallmar's team scored 33.3 per cent from the field.

Franklin led the Webfoots with 18 points and again shone on the boards, grabbing 20 rebounds. Gangling Max Anderson got 16 points, 10 coming from the free throw line. The Oregon team hit only 16 of 63 from the field for 25.4 per cent.

The referees were quick on the whistle and 48 personals and one technical foul were called.

Washington defeated OSC 66-53 and 83-63 to remain in second place. USC is tied with the Huskies at 5-1 and waltzed past Idaho by 65-56 and 73-59 counts in the only other conference action over the weekend.

Selleck, 5'8" guard, scored 37 points in the series and personally broke open the second game when he hit four straight long jump shots late in the first half and found Brown with two deadly passes for lay-ups after interception. The Indians had been having trouble with the UO zone defense up to this point and were trailing 26-22 with two and one-half minutes left in the first half. When the air cleared, Stanford led 39-29 after two minutes of the second period.

Barry Brown scored 34 points in the two games and held Webfoot center Max Anderson to only three field goals in both games. The 6'4" senior pivot man was also a power on the boards. Junior forward Bill Bond scored 32 points, most of them via his favorite jump shots off the Stanford screening offense.
