AWS Petitions Due Wednesday

Petitions for AWS officers for 1956-57 will be due Wednesday at 5 p.m., according to Sally Ryan, AWS vice-president who is in charge of the elections.

Petitioners will be interviewed by Miss Ryan and AWS president Jane Bergstrom who then will recommend candidates to the AWS nominating committee.

Elections will be held Feb. 21 during Women's week, in conjunction with the YWCA and WRA elections.

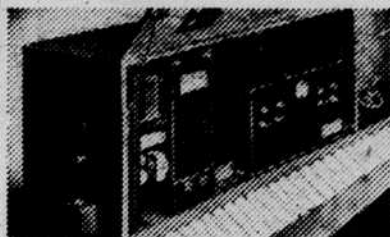
Faculty members from the department of sociology will discuss a variety of vocational opportunities in the field of sociology.

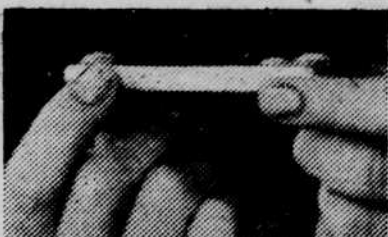
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
