## Ike, Prime Minister Discuss Situation in Israel Tuesday

WASHINGTON (AP) — The possibility of stationing United Nations forces between Israel and her Arab neighbors was brought up by Britain Tuesday in the Eisenhower-Eden talks but the idea reportedly got a cool American reception.

A spokesman reporting on the conference between President Eisenhower and Prime Minister Eden told newsmen no decision was reached on the proposal, which he said was advanced as a way to secure peace in the Middle East.

Responsible American officials indicated that Eisenhower and Secretary of State Dulles were lukewarm toward the idea.

### Admission Question

The spokesman also said the question of Red China's possible admission to the United Nations came up, along with Britain's desire to ease existing controls on commerce with the Chinese Communists.

The conferences apparently failed to settle conflicting American-British views on these twin problems. The spokesman said

the United States remains opposed to Red Chinese membership in the U. N. and that the policy of Britain, which recognizes Red China, has not changed.

Immediately after the last of Tuesday's three meetings, Sen. George (D-Ga.), chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations committee, and Sen. Knowland (R-Calif.), minority leader in the Senate, were invited by Eisenhower to the White House to discuss the conferences with him and Eden.

### Wide Range

The conference spokesman said the meetings covered a wide range of problems, including a possible meeting between Secretary of State Dulles and Premier Chou En-Lai of Red China. Chou's speech threatening "war if necessary" to gain control of Formosa also was discussed, he said.

Eisenhower and Eden, on this second day of conferences, appeared to be concentrating on the crisis-ridden Middle East

where there is serious threat of war between Israel and the Arab countries.

The joint British-American spokesman said both leaders are looking into this problem with the hope of arriving at some preventive formula.

It is within this framework, he said, that a proposal was discussed for stationing United Nations military forces in the demilitarized areas set up by the United Nations between Israeli and Arab territory.

British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd raised the possibility of such action in an address before the House of Commons. This plan also was put forward by Adlai Stevenson Nov. 11 in a speech calling for more vigorous government action to prevent a mid east war.

Harold Stassen, White House disarmament adviser, joined the White House meeting for a general review of the deadlocked East-West efforts to reduce armaments.

## Norway Seizes Russian Boats

OSLO, Norway (AP) — Norway announced Tuesday night its navy has seized Russian trawlers in Norwegian fishing waters but others still are attempting to invade the 4-mile coastal belt.

The Norwegian Embassy in Moscow has been instructed to deliver a sharp protest to the Soviet Foreign Ministry. Norway's Foreign Minister Halvard Lange has summoned Soviet Ambassador G. P. Arkadiev to a meeting.

Observers here said the invasion of the rich herring banks off Norway's western shore is taking on the aspect of a carefully planned campaign. The Soviet trawlers keep returning every time they are chased away by naval vessels.

### Warning Shots

Lt. Cmdr. Bjarne Eia, commander of one navy patrol, said Soviet radio operators on the trawlers are trying to jam communication between the Norwegian craft. Two of the trawlers taken Tuesday had to be halted by warning shots.

More Norwegian torpedo boats and the frigate Tromsø are en route to the scene of action off

Alesund. Norwegian fishermen reported between 30 and 80 Russian vessels are in the area.

Three of the trawlers seized Tuesday were taken by the submarine tender Sarpren.

### Touchy Situation

The situation was made more touchy because of a scheduled visit to Alesund of the Russian fisheries minister, A. A. Ischkov. He is to arrive in Oslo as the official guest of the Norwegian government on Friday and go on to the Alesund fishing grounds on Feb. 7.

Acting on unofficial reports, the Norwegian navy Monday dispatched two motor torpedo boats from Bergen to intercept the Russian fleet, which was operating near the Norwegian coast.
