Barbershop Ballad Contest Sunday On TV Salutes 'Good Old Days'

The "Good Old Days," when women wore long, long skirts and men gathered in barbershops and sang sentimental songs are being saluted this week, not only by the Oregon campus but by a national television network.

An estimated 20,000,000 viewers will see a preview of the barbershop ballad contest at Forest Grove on "Wide Wide World" which will be seen Sunday over channel 13 at 1 p.m. The programs will feature "Celebrations" from many parts of the country, also featuring a trip to Mexico.

Sunday's telecast will be the second time that Oregon has appeared on the show, the first being a segment last year from Timberline Lodge. Although the ballad contest will be held on Feb. 23, 24, and 25, "Wide Wide World" is not shown on that week, and a special preview of the festival had to be arranged.

We never knew that Jack Webb would come to this. As a result of the recent campaign by the Los Angeles police department against the word "cop," "Dragnet" may soon open with the line "My name is Friday. I'm a police officer." "Whoopie!" rejoices "TV Guide" magazine. "Television movies are getting younger." This was inevitable, however, as those old films just couldn't last forever. Portland viewers will get a chance to see some of their old "favorites" again, as a new television station usually falls back on the old movie releases. Another new station, channel 4 in Roseburg, plans to start broadcasting on Feb. 14.

Twice as many college students would prefer to give up television than radio. Despite how deflating this news may be to a television columnist, the Associated Collegiate Press is convinced of the fact. Over 54 per cent of college students, they say, feel that television takes too much concentration while it is possible to study and listen to the radio.

Contrasted with these figures, only 29 per cent of the adults questioned felt that they would rather do away with television. Approximately 61 per cent would give up radio. The remaining group had no preference.

No explanation is given by the AP, but it would seem that tele-

vision is not as popular with college students because they don't have as much opportunity to view many programs. While other groups may develop a preference for certain programs, the college student gets very few opportunities for regular watching.
