

Rev. Nicholson Speaks On 'Plight of Arabs'

"The Plight of the Arab in the Near East" will be the subject of Rev. Wesley G. Nicholson, minister of the First Congregational church in Eugene, at the Wednesday night browsing room

lecture at 7:30 in the Student Union.

During the summer of 1954, Nicholson went to Israel, Jordan, Lebanon and Turkey. He visited there as well as in other parts of Europe with an inter-cultural group sponsored by the National Council of Christians and Jews. The group studied what was being done to bring understanding between faith groups.

In his talk Nicholson will trace

the effect of the U.N. partition of Israel. He will explain how the Arabs feel about the partition and why they feel as they do.

Nicholson is in his 13th year as minister of the local First Congregational church. He did his graduate study in theology at Harvard university.

The discussion leader after the lecture will be Charles P. Schleicher, professor of political science.

Library Receives American Imprints

The first installment of the 30,000 volume Early American Imprints, containing every book, pamphlet, and broadside published in America between 1630 and 1800, has recently been received by the University library.

The American Antiquarian society microprint edition, when completed in 10 years, will be the most comprehensive collection of colonial and revolutionary American printing put together.

Editors of the Antiquarian society are locating copies of every item listed in Evans American Bibliography published up to 1800. Each publication is reproduced on microprint exactly as published with 100 pages of text on a single six by nine inch card.

When completed, the 30,000 volume edition will take up 25 feet of shelf space.

Columbia College Article Written by Morrison

An article concerning Eugene's Columbia College which appeared in the December issue of the Oregon Historical Quarterly was written by Perry D. Morrison, head social science librarian in the University library.

Morrison's article shows how

the college was indirectly a forerunner of the University, although it was only in operation from 1856 to 1860.

The college at one time had an enrollment of 150 students. Most of the instruction was on a college-preparatory rather than on a collegiate level by present-day standards.

According to Morrison, the life of the institution was characterized by financial fiasco, two fires, and a felony. The felony, an attempted homicide by a professor Ryan who served briefly as president, ended the active life of the college.

SU Hosts USMC Procurement Team

A Marine Corps Officer Procurement team will be in the Student Union on Thursday and Friday to interview students interested in obtaining a commission through the Platoon Leaders class.

The program is open to freshmen, sophomore, and junior men who meet the USMC requirements. Candidates will attend two six-week summer training sessions at Quantico, Va., and will receive commissions as Second Lieutenants on graduation.

Officer Candidate courses also are available to college graduates and seniors. Men selected for the course take basic training at Quantico, Va., and receive commissions after completion of the training.

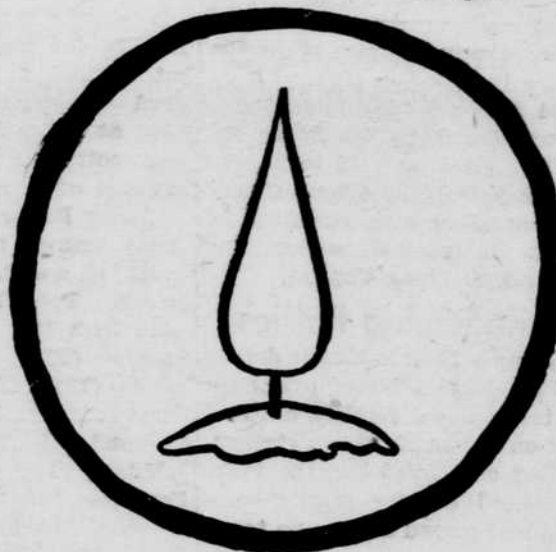
Dormitory Costs Due for Increase

Approval was given to the hike in fees by the Board of Higher Education last week. Officials said the increase is necessary because of a decision by the recent Legislature that utilities costs at dormitories, previously paid from board funds, must be paid from dorm fees.

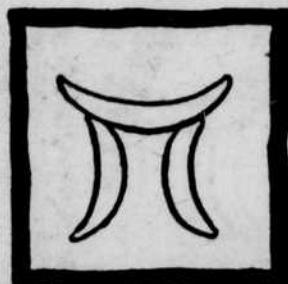
