Southern California basketball coach Forrest Twogood is one of those men who can talk for quite a while, yet not say a great deal—a trait which, we've noticed, is not at all uncommon in his profession. Saturday night he talked a lot about basketball, but most of it came out something like "this Pacific Coast conference idea is great—it's a wonderful league this way!"

So as yet we have nothing but affirmative votes for the coast-wise loop setup which conference officials put into practice again this year after some 30 years of northern and southern division play. Twogood, like most others, thinks that the proposed home-and-home schedule within the same conference setup "will be a lot better; it'll make the league a lot more interesting. Oh, yes, I like Bill's (Borcher) plan (with teams traveling to and playing in the regions—Oregon would go to the Bay for a weekend, play Stanford Friday and Cal Saturday; Stanford would come to the Willamette valley for a game with Oregon on Friday, OSC on Saturday, and similarly throughout the conference). I'm for anything that will give us a good league."

"But they can't do it next year. We haven't got any gym down there—we can't work anything good with the Pan-Pacific auditorium—they'll have to build something first. It wouldn't be good—nor fair to the Northern Division teams—to stick the games off in some high school, especially in a home-and-home deal."

"A Lot of Wins..."

And about other things: "You've got a good club here. You're going to win a lot of ball games. You've got a good chance to go somewhere. And so's this club," and he made a sweeping gesture behind him in the dressing room filled with happy Trojans chorusing "Fight On for Old SC."

"Right now UCLA's tops, but everybody has an off night—look at us last night (Friday—the Trojans shot .159 from the field in losing). And the same thing happened to Bill (Oregon won with a field goal average of .246)."

"Yeah, UCLA is good, but they've still got to meet Oregon State and Stanford—and none of us can run with Stanford—and then they have to play us, of course. Sure, these kids could do it, although I don't know. But your kids have got a good chance too."

About USC's recent road stint to Idaho at the end of the Trojans' final exam week: "Oh, yeah, it was rough. You see finals weren't really over—this was the last weekend of finals themselves. We only had about three workouts—I was really happy to get out of Moscow—especially with two wins. It was our shooting that carried us through—we just hit."

Oregon athletic publicity assistant Jack Collins came into the noisy room and asked Twogood for his top ten for the United Press basketball poll, "I haven't really thought about it, but I suppose I can give 'em to you. I don't suppose I can get anyone to argue about first place. Can USF be stopped? Sure, there never was a team that couldn't be."

Many Good Sophomores

And about individuals in the conference so far this season: "Oh, yes, there are a lot of good sophomores. Sure, Boin, Gamber, Nanson, Franklin, Robinson—they're all good—and this kid Hauser (Larry—a slim SC guard), he's right up there too. But it's a good league. This boy Ross is one of the best we've run up against—one of the very best. It's a good league—a wonderful league."

The George Gobelish man who came out Friday night to take over referee John Mandic's whistle when the former Oregon State All-American was put out of the game with a Charlie-horse was the PCC commissioner of officials, Lloyd Leith. Leith had been keeping score on the calls by Mandic and his running mate, E. J. Oakland, when Bill Borcher looked at Mandic's limp and shrugged helplessly toward Leith, who was peering over his reading glasses from the press row.

University President O. Meredith Wilson offered to Leith that he would go home for his striped shirt and take over himself, but Leith declined and was forced to leave his scorekeeping until Saturday, when he was undisturbed by casualties in the ranks of his men—disabling casualties, that is.

Seattle Alums Say Cassill Released 'Within 24 Hours'

SPOKANE (AP)—University of Washington alumni told the Spokesman-Review Monday night that athletic director Harvey Cassill will be discharged from university "within the next 24 hours."

The alumni said the information came from the same Seattle source which knew of Johnny Cherberg's release as head football coach at the university more than 36 hours before the action was made public.

The paper said one of the local alumni group pointed out Cassill had returned rather abruptly after a flying trip to Chicago where he was reportedly in search of a successor to Cherberg.

Cassill, who has been under fire because of his handling of the Cherberg said, on his return to Seattle that he had not come back to resign. "They'll have to fire me," he said.

Eugene Leads Prep Ranking

Defending state champion Eugene was rated the No. 1 team in Oregon by every sportswriter and broadcaster who took part in this week's Associated Press high school basketball poll.

The Axemen's impressive victories over Marshfield and North Bend last weekend were taken into consideration as Eugene won the top spot for the second week in a row.

Jefferson, which posted victories over Benson and Roosevelt in Portland league action, retained second place.

Franklin, No. 3 last week, held that same position after this week's balloting despite an upset loss to unranked Grant.

Marshfield's losses to Eugene and Springfield contributed to the Pirates fall from fourth to fifth place behind Medford.

Medford, which defeated Roseburg 59-50 last weekend, was sixth in last week's poll, and moved up two notches this week.

Pendleton, ninth last week, advanced to sixth on the strength of a 71-68 victory over Milton-Freewater. The loss dropped Mac Hi from seventh to eighth place. Milwaukie, which won its two games last week, took over seventh, advancing one notch.

Beaverton, tied with Bend for tenth place in the previous poll, advanced to ninth and Bend was alone in the tenth position.

South Salem made a strong showing but was two points shy of winning a place among the top 10.

Ten points are awarded for a first place vote, nine for second, and so on.
