Psych Department Gets Study Grant

The U.S. Health service has allocated a grant to the University psychology department for the study of cat behavior.

The research on cats will be similar to the behavioral study of monkeys now in progress. Both studies are headed by John M. Warren Jr., assistant professor of psychology.

Experiments will be made to determine the effects of surgery in the association areas on the cats learned behavior. Researchers will correlate factors in their results, such as age of the cats at the time of surgery and pre-operative and post-operative training.

The monkey experiment, a three-year project, was begun last fall, and involves the types of behavior resulting from experimental stress and motivational conflict. It is believed that findings in such research will be helpful in determining treatment for human behavior disorders.

Original Cast to Repeat 'Macbeth'

Kitchen, Fishbowl, Cafeteria Among Student Union Facilities

Ed. note: This is the second in a series on Student Union facilities.

The Student Union food department serves three functions, the soda bar, cafeteria and catering service.

Greatest revenue is realized from the soda bar which is open anytime the building is open, according to Bob Smith, SU dietician. Approximately 1500 students pass through the soda bar line each day. However, because of the class schedule the heaviest days are Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

Most Consumed Items

Items of largest single consumption are coffee and coke. About 1700 cups of coffee are sold a day, but the amount consumed is subject to wide fluctuations because of activities. As one would expect, hamburgers are the largest food item sold.

The fishbowl has a seating capacity of 350. The booths along the side are a new addition this year and are best for the cafeteria trade. Smith pointed out that there has been increasingly more use of the SU each term. Busiest times for the soda bar are 10 a.m., noon, and 3 p.m.

At 10 the largest demand is for coffee and donuts, at noon for short orders, and at 3 for coffee and soft drinks. Evenings are unpredictable, Smith said. During a typical Wednesday 1512 persons came through the soda bar line.

Television Set

Just off the fishbowl is a commuter's room, which was originally designed for commuters eating sack lunches. Smith commented that it may eventually be used for coffee and donut service during vacations when the rest of the building is closed. Presently the SU television set is located in this room. A door from the outside of the SU is currently being constructed.

The cafeteria, along the side of the kitchen, is open from 11:45 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and from 5:30 to 6:15 p.m. Service in the cafeteria is a la carte. Three entre items and a number of salads, soups, and chilis are presented

Job Opportunities

each day. Smith said that they can move eight persons a minute through the cafeteria line.

Catering Service

Catering service, unknown to many people, is done by special contract. Students or departmental personnel may reserve space for a meeting and then make a catering contract with Smith if they wish refreshments or dinner.

Seven-hundred persons can be seated upstairs in the ballroom and 150 in five rooms downstairs. The doors between these meeting rooms can be pushed back to make one big room.

Refreshments are often ordered for meetings and for intermissions at dances. Heavy catering for student functions usually begins a while after the term starts. The SU catering service is the largest one south of Portland and north of San Francisco. OSC is able to serve 600.

Ten civil service personnel, nine women and one man, are employed in the kitchen plus 25 students. Sixty to 70 students are on call for catering. Students are paid \$.80 an hour during their

first year and \$.85 the second. A \$2000 payroll goes back to the students.

In the kitchen are three large refrigerators which contain fruit, vegetables, meat and soda items. An "Archibald" type oven heated at 110° can keep food warm.

No food is precooked, Smith said. The kitchen also has a large steam cooker for vegetables and two double boilers, one with a 60 gallon capacity and the other with an 80 gallon capacity. Off the kitchen is the dish washing room with a conveyer-driven dish washer.

Such machinery is more expensive than a Cadillac, Smith commented. Another large refrigerated store room, completed in September, is located in back of the kitchen where meat, bread and pies can be kept on hand.

Pies are baked in Carson hall

and sent to the SU. Also back of the kitchen is a storeroom for dry goods and a plan of the SU from which Smith can determine if he can take care of the type of function an organization might want to stage.

Freight Elevator

A freight elevator takes food up to the second floor behind the upstairs servery. An intercommunications system has been installed from the main kitchen to the servery. Dishes for 400 are kept in here along with a 30-gallon coffee urn. A large round table, similar to a lazy susan, is located in the middle of the servery. By rotating 28.5 plates can be served per minute.

According to Smith the kitchen services are run on a non-profit basis. He also said that more improvements are planned for each year.

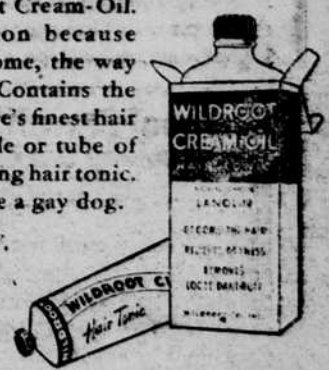
