

Last Billiards Contest Scheduled for Today

The last contest in the series of National Billiards tournaments preceding the national face-to-face competition will be held at 4 p. m. today in the Student Union recreation area.

The billiards team will compete via air mail routes, with other campuses throughout the nation in the three-cushion billiards play.

High scores were received by the team in both the pocket and the strait-rail contests held earlier in the month. Team members are working toward a berth in the national face-to-face competition to be held March 24 at Michigan State college. Charlie Peterson, well-known billiard ace, will award a trophy to the cam-

pus team scoring highest in the national tournament in all events, including the coed pocket billiards tournament.

The highest scorer in each event will also receive the national title for that phase of billiards.

Last year Michigan State took the national championship with the greatest number of place points for all the events. Stan Williams of Oregon placed second in the strait-rail competition.

Also at 4 p. m. today in the SU recreation area, one of a series of women's National Pocket Billiards tournaments will be held.

With the same rules as the men's pocket billiards tournament, this tourney will be a part of the basis on which the Charlie Peterson award will be given.

Participants in the women's meet will be Lee McGary, Maurine Moen and Darla Earl.

State Board Gives Enrollment Ruling

The University and other state-supported schools may legally restrict their enrollments on the basis of scholastic ability, according to Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton. He had been asked for an opinion because of present overcrowded conditions in schools of the state board of higher education.

The ruling will give the state board the authority to keep out students which the board feels would not be able to do satisfactory college work.

Thornton said that the state board of higher education is considering the possibility of giving entrance examinations to determine the ability of students to carry on college-level work.

Gilson Scheduled As Part Of Failing Lectures Series

Etienne Gilson, internationally-recognized Catholic scholar and director of the Institute of Mediaeval Studies at the University of Toronto, Canada, will be guest lecturer Thursday at 8 p. m. in the Student Union, as a part of the Failing Distinguished Lectures series.

Gilson obtained his doctorate from the University of Paris after which he taught at the University of Strasbourg, the Sorbonne. He has been at the University of Toronto since 1929.

In 1932 he was named professor of the history of mediaeval philosophy at the College de France and in 1947 was elected a member of the French Academy.

Gilson has been the Gifford lecturer at the University of Aberdeen, the Richards lecturer at the University of Virginia, and the

William James lecturer at Harvard university.

He has been appointed Conseiller de la Republique and has received honorary doctorates from St. Andrews university, the University of Montreal, the Catholic university of Milan, and Harvard.

Ross Honors Mozart In Browsing Lecture

"Such Forms as Glitter: Architecture in the Time of Mozart" will be topic of M. D. Ross, associate professor of architecture, at tonight's browsing room lecture at 7:30 in the Student Union.

Ross' talk is the last in the

winter term series, and the third in commemoration of the bi-centennial of Mozart's birth.

He will discuss the most important development in architecture during the second half of the 18th century.

The development in architecture has been said to be equivalent in quality to the music of Mozart. Without one art directly influencing the forms of another, there is nonetheless a certain universal spirit current at any one historic period, Ross said.

He will use slides to illustrate his remarks; some of which were taken in Europe last summer.

Leading the discussion after the lecture will be R. C. Ball Jr., assistant professor of English.
