

Jazz Fans Discuss Club Formation Plan

Jazz fans who met in the Student Union Tuesday to discuss formation of a campus jazz club slated their next meeting for Thursday night at 6:30, also in the SU.

Bill Sanders, junior in journalism, presided at the meeting, which was attended by 55 University and high school students.

Sanders and Ron Brown, freshman in journalism and KASH "Top Pops" announcer, explained to the group that the function of the club would be to promote jazz on the campus.

To Meet Regularly

They said the club would meet weekly or every other week for proposed projects such as discussion groups, record listening groups, guest lecturers and performers, hi-fi, and care of records. Sanders said that the club, tentatively called the Modern Jazz Society, would try to organize sessions with local musicians,

and eventually try to promote concerts by big-name artists from outside the area.

Policy Group Named

Volunteers for a policy committee stayed after the meeting to decide on issues to be discussed at Thursday night's meeting of the group. The policy committee will consider meeting times, dues, initiation fees, plans for coming meetings, and a revision of the club's name.

Members of the policy committee are Tom Eckert, Mike Smith, Chuck Hall, Ron Brown, Gary Allen, Stan Parry, John Lengal, Bill Leitch, Dave Marshall, Keith Johnson, and Max Pierce.

George Etue, instructor in history, was introduced as the faculty adviser of the group. C. F. Ruff, instructor in English, was also present.

Divided Opinion

The group was divided as to the type or types of jazz that the club should consider. Brown urged the fans to "learn more about all kinds of jazz."

Sanders thought "jazz as a whole" should be considered.

Ruff thought the group

"should consider the whole manifestation of jazz." He urged the group not to break up into "cults of jazz."

Sanders told the jazz fans that the club would have to limit its membership to University students in order to be under the sponsorship of the SU board. However, he told high school students that he would find out about admitting them to the club.

One of the high school students suggested the possibility of starting clubs of their own in the local high schools.

Junior Weekend Position Open

General chairmen for Junior Weekend events will be selected next week, according to Doug Basham, junior class president and chairman of the weekend.

Petitions for all-campus clean-up, junior prom, luncheon, all-campus sing and queen selection and coronation chairmanships may be picked up at the Student Union's ASUO petition box this weekend and are due next Tuesday at 5 p.m., according to Basham.

Class officers will handle administrative duties of the weekend, such as finance and secretary work, he said. Publicity chairman Carol Craig, and promotion co-chairmen Bill Moore and Marcia Mauney have already been selected.

Mozart Opera Shown In Lithography Display

A lithographic interpretation of Mozart's opera "Marriage of Figaro" is now on display in the University library circulation lobby in connection with the Mozart Festival of Arts celebration here.

The art display, one of three loans from the National Gallery in Washington, D.C., will be up until March 10, and is correlated with the showing of a film of the opera to be given March 7 at Commonwealth 138.

to Basham and Brittsan, signers of the letter. But he was still unconvinced this was the answer in following years.

"I'm for any plan to get the best men in office, regardless of party," Farrow added.

Sees Weaknesses

Farrow does not believe the part of the plan intended to safeguard against one party secretly following present party lines sufficient, and said it was inconsistent with other parts of the proposal.

Hinkson repeated his statement that action is now up to the two parties.

Vahey, UIS candidate for president at the last election, said his party had no officers and has not yet met this year.

Dorwin Strongly Opposes

IFC President Dorwin's statement was the strongest made in opposition.

"I feel morally obligated to help perpetuate in both name

and spirit a system and a party which has produced unlimited benefits for its members," he said. "I have watched the common bond of fellowship prosper within the system."

"Whatever is done, I'd like to see the Greeks do it together," Dorwin added.
