The comedy was written by Colum, better known as an Irish poet in 1929. It reflects the spirit of the "roaring 20's."

The play is about a typical man in the street, Caspar, played by Bruce Holt, his dreams of becoming a hero and how he tries to realize his dreams. He enters the Hotel Daedalus, where he meets a minister of war, an opera singer, a prize-fighter, a movie queen, and other famous and successful people. Caspar's simplicity causes him to become somewhat of a hero to the hotel guests.

Caspar falls in love with Paras Veka, played by Elizabeth Yeager. She is the daughter of Glock, a philosophical clown who is employed in the hotel as recreation director. The role of Glock is played by Irle White.

Co-op Program Told by Institute

Graduating seniors in electrical engineering and physics who have high academic standing and an interest in a career in research are invited to apply for participation in the Honors Co-operative program at Stanford Research Institute.

This two year program provides participants with full-time employment in the regular research programs of the Institute, and concurrently permits study for an advanced degree at Stanford university.

A full year of graduate work leading to a Master's degree can usually be completed in two years under the program. The Institute pays all tuition associated with the program. Half will be paid during each academic quarter and the remaining sum upon successful completion of the Master's degree.

Candidates must be students from accredited universities or colleges who will receive the B.S. or B.A. degree during the present academic year, and who have outstanding academic records; meet the qualifications for admission as a graduate student to Stanford university, and are U.S. citizens who can obtain the necessary security clearance.

Students who meet the stated qualifications may write to the Education Committee, Stanford Research Institute.

Poll Shows College Students Think Ike Made 'Bad Choice'

Students polled throughout the Midwest and Eastern parts of the country by Associated Collegiate Press, some weeks ago, seemed to feel that President Eisenhower made a "bad choice" in deciding to run for another term.

Answers found by the ACP differ sharply with those seen at the University, where 19 of 26 students polled approved of the choice of the president.

Question asked by the ACP, and the answers they obtained, was as follows:

In view of his recent heart attack, do you think President Eisenhower should run for a second term in 1956?

The results:

	Men	Women	Total

No	70%	73%	71%
Undecided	14%	8%	12%

The basis for most decisions rest on the condition of the President's health. Most of the students surveyed feel he should not take a chance of endangering his life by running for a second term. Some students show political leanings by indicating they feel he should not run under any circumstances.

A junior at University college, New York university (Bronx, N.Y.) disagrees with President Eisenhower's decision when he

says "The President should be in good health; it is unfair to the country for him to run." A sophomore attending the University of Minnesota (Minneapolis) feels that "No man's health should be endangered for political reasons."

A Hunter college (New York City) coed agrees with the President's decision to run when she says "Many other people have heart attacks but they don't give up." A freshman coed at the University of Nebraska (Lincoln) also agrees with the President's decision; she feels he should have run again "in view of the fact that his heart and general physical condition are now back to normal."

One undecided junior at Iowa State college (Ames) believes "a heart attack should not be the basis for running or not running."

Student Athletic Recruiting Urged

University students may soon be doing more of the athletic recruiting for the school.

A proposed ASUO athletic board which would broaden the functions of the present athletic advisory committee was approved unanimously by the ASUO Cabinet Wednesday night, along with an amendment to the ASUO by-laws regulating the approval and presentation of athletic letters.

Phil Lynch, ASUO athletic chairman, proposed the board which would aid the athletic department in recruiting high school athletes.

The plan would work like this: The athletic department would give the board a list of the high school athletes it was interested in getting. The committee would then find University students from the same city who knew the athlete, and would try to talk him into enrolling here.

Contact More Personal

Lynch and other Cabinet members felt that this method would be more effective than the more impersonal contact with alumni, coaches and other officials. This plan is intended only to supplement, not replace, present recruiting methods.

In addition the board would serve as a co-ordinating body between the student and the athletic department. This is now the function of the athletic advisory committee.

Lynch said that the present

committee was ineffective because students don't bring their problems to it, and because many of the members lack interest in athletics, or have too many other activities.

Members of the new board would include the athletic chairman, athletic director, athletic new director, alumni secretary, associate director of student affairs for men, ASUO president, Emerald editor, Order of 'O' president and a representative each from AWS, the fraternity system and the men's dorms.

Needs Groups' Approval

Lynch's proposal must now be approved by the ASUO Senate, the athletic department and the office of student affairs.

The amendment to the by-laws would add two more sections on the presentation of athletic letters. One section provides that "The Senate shall vote upon all athletic awards prior to presentation," and the second that the "presentation of awards, as approved by the Senate, shall be the responsibility of the ASUO athletic chairman."

Lynch said these amendments would be presented to the Senate at its first meeting Spring term.

They are intended to supplement the present constitutional provision that "The Senate shall make all athletic awards in accordance with rules and regulations as determined by the Senate."
