

Webfoots Scrimmage, Test Eyes for Cougars

Oregon Coach Bill Borchers stressed offense again Wednesday as he ran his Webfoots through a stiff practice session in preparation for the upcoming series with Washington State's Cougars.

Using a modified starting lineup which added 6'6" Hal Duffy

and driving guard Wimp Hastings to the Duck attack, Borchers gave his charges lots of scrimmage, plus work on their shooting.

No specific plans to stop the Cougar attack (which rolled over Stanford in one game of a series last week) have been set up, but if extra work on the shooting produces results like the .400-plus

results in the second UCLA game that came from last week's practice, nothing else will be needed.

Washington State's big gun against the Indians was Larry Beck, who scored 28 points Saturday night to lead the Cougars to their unprecedented 69-67 win. Trailing Beck was Sophomore Dick Rask, former Jefferson high star, who tallied 15 points.

Ed Steele, another sophomore Portland Interscholastic League product, started at forward, and dependable Al Perry opened at the other guard spot for the Cougars. Bill Galbraith averages eight points a game at center for WSC.

Both games are scheduled to start at 8 p.m., preceded by freshman tilts.

Schadewitz Keeps Lead

SEATTLE (P) — Ted Schadewitz of Eastern Oregon college has held firmly to his rating as the Pacific northwest's steadiest basketball player.

For quibblers, the Schadewitz figure is 21.97, but nobody is close enough to the Gunner of the Grande Ronde to argue. In second place with a 21.8 average is Don Porter of Linfield and third spot is ruled by R. C. Owens of College of Idaho at 21.1.

Little Jimmy Winters of Portland university, whose 533 points tops everybody for total production, ranks fourth with a 20.5 average. In fifth spot is Dick Stricklin of Seattle university.

Two other players are averaging in the 19-point area with only a few games left to play. Cal Bauer of Seattle checked in with 19.4 and Dave Gambee of Oregon State has averaged 19.1.

Next match for the Ducks will be the Northwest Regional Bowling tournament at Oregon, April 12, 13, 14.

University of Oregon rounds out its 1956 swimming agenda by competing in the annual Northern Division meet to be held at Pullman, Wash. this weekend.

Preliminaries will begin at 2 p.m. on Friday for half the events, and the finals for those events will be held that night at 7:30. The rest of the meet will be finished on Saturday.

The Webfoots, with a nine man traveling team, left for Pullman at 6 p.m. Wednesday in good shape, and they are eyeing a possible third in the division. The distance men have especially cut down their times lately, as Don Jacklin and Yoji Matsushima have been progressing rapidly throughout the season, and Matsushima's time is as good as any recorded on the coast so far this season.

Heavily favored will be the University of Washington, which has gone through the ranks undefeated. Oregon State will probably finish second, and from there on down the line is still a question.

Oregon's chief assets will be Steve Hall and Bob Hays in the breast stroke events, Jerry Froebe in the free style events, Yoji Matsushima in the distances, and

Billy Warner in the diving events. Also slated to win points will be Don Jacklin in the distances, Bill Goodwin in the back stroke races, Bob Beatty in the distances, and Doug Burns in the free style races.

No Predictions For Herb Score; He's Just Prayin'

TUCSON, Ariz. (P) — Herb Score isn't predicting he'll win a single game for the Cleveland Indians this year, just praying he'll do as well as last.

In making his 16-12 record in 1955 the big left-handed pitcher set a major league rookie mark with 245 strikeouts and was named the American League rookie of the year.

Everyone in the Indians' camp—except Score—is confident he will win 20 games or more this season.

"I'm glad they have confidence in me, but I may not win a game," Score said Wednesday.

"Just because I had a good season last year doesn't mean I'll be as good this year. Every season, every game is a new one."

Score, a devout Roman Catholic, says this is what he believes:

"God gave me a good arm. It's up to me to work hard, and learn all I can. That's what I'm trying to do. I pray when I'm pitching. I know that the hitter in front of me is probably praying too, but it helps."

"I'm still pretty wild. That's what gets me into trouble. Oh I don't throw over the backstop but I walked 150 in 1955. I pitched only one game all season when I didn't give up a single walk."

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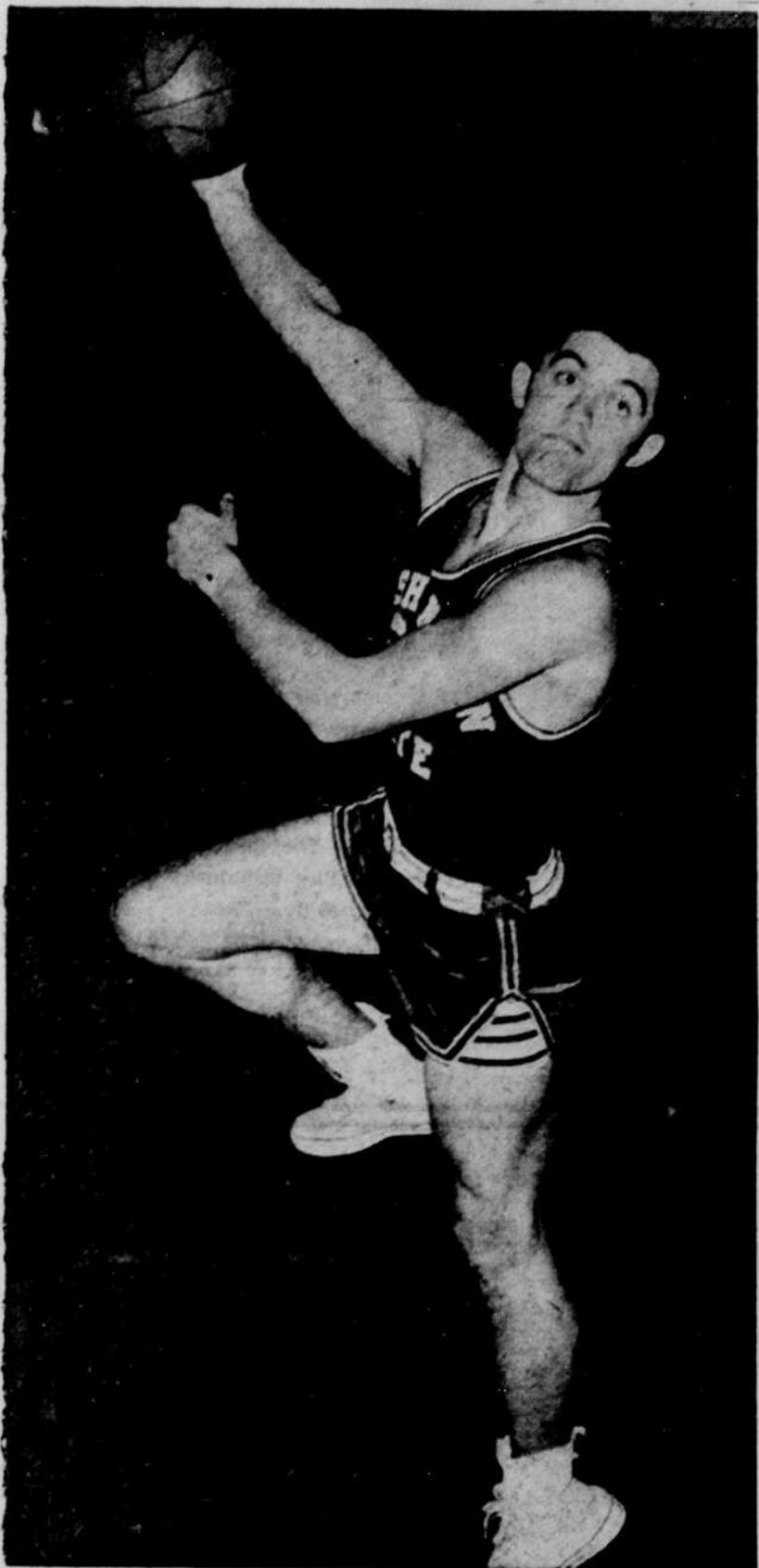

Idaho State, Seattle U Meet for NCAA Spot

SEATTLE (P) — Idaho State and Seattle university will meet March 12 in Seattle for the right to play in the NCAA regional

basketball tourney at Corvallis, Ore., that weekend.

Seattle U. officials announced Wednesday the decision was reached by a flip of the coin during a three-way telephone conference among Reeves Peters of the NCAA at Kansas City, Coach Al Brightman here and Athletic Director John Vesser of Idaho State at Pocatello.

Brightman said the choice was narrowed down to Pocatello and Seattle and then a neutral party was called in at Kansas City to flip the coin.

The game is considered a part of the regional qualifying play. Idaho State earned the chance as champion of the Rocky Mountain conference and Seattle U. was picked as an at-large entry.

The game here will be in the University of Washington pavilion.

Adult Tourney Prices Due for UO Students

University students will be admitted to the high school basketball tournament in McArthur Court, March 13-17, on adult tickets only, according to tournament officials.
