

Model UN Draws Oregon Delegates

Delegates to the Model United Nations will depart Wednesday morning to participate in the five day conference which will be held at Oregon State college.

The delegates met Wednesday to decide the chief meetings each would attend. Wynn Dahlgren was appointed to the Security council; Elton Engrstrom, Economic and Social; Gary Petersen, to the Ad Hoc Political committee and Ad Hoc Peace Observation committee; Steve Chemytsch, Continuation committee. Chemytsch is from the Ukraine and will act as general chairman for the delegation.

The chief delegates to the General Assembly committees are: E. Baughmn Lee, Political and Security; Chuck Creamer and Richard Lenhart, Economic and Financial; Regina Hannon and Janet Bellim, Social, Humanitarian and Cultural; Evelyn Olsen and Mary Lou Qualls, Trusteeship; Richard Lenhart will also participate on the International Court of Justice committee.

Judges on the International Court of Justice were chosen from the laws schools of Willamette, University of Oregon and Oregon State college. These students are not affiliated with the regular delegation from the campuses to the Model U.N. Oregon students chosen to act as judges include: George Boyet, Baldev Singh, Frederick K. Pfeil, Bertram Collins, and M. T. Umemura.

The executive committee for the delegation consists of: Chairman Chemytsch, Sanford Milkes, Wynn Dahlgren, Lee and Creamer. C. P. Schlicher, professor of

political science and adviser to the group announced that the delegation had decided to cancel their representation to Nepal.

Brief speeches will be presented by the delegates tonight from 6:30 to 8 p.m. Future meetings will be held Monday at 4 p.m. and Tuesday from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. in Commonwealth, 332.

Transportation to the Model U.N. will be provided by Schlicher, Petersen and Creamer.

Panel Discusses 'Crusade' Topic

A panel discussed the Crusade for Freedom movement Wednesday evening—both the purposes of the organizations and the results which it is achieving.

Panel members were A.S. Hough instructor of speech; Pierre du-Payrat; Steve Chemytsch, senior in political science; John Hulteng, associate professor of journalism; and Herman Cohen, associate professor of speech.

The purposes of Radio Free Europe were given, and while panel members shared the opinion that the objectives were worthwhile, some of them felt that the program could be carried out more effectively.

Nationalistic Element

Part of the effectiveness of Radio Free Europe lies in its ability to broadcast such things as local news, national songs, and various other entertainment of great interest to people in the captive countries who do not otherwise receive this type of program due to prohibition of such programs by the Communists.

As Radio Free Europe is an independent organization, it can disseminate this type of program, while the Voice of America is concerned with another type of program due to government restrictions which are imposed upon it. Radio Free Europe is a privately owned organization, with its purpose being to combat Soviet lies and keep hope alive, rather than to promote revolution. People in five countries behind the Iron Curtain receive Radio Free Europe broadcasts.

Many Don't Receive

The effectiveness of the broadcasts is hampered by the fact that it cannot reach many of the countries behind the Iron Curtain.

Information about the Crusade for Freedom week being held on campus next week was given. The campaign will be of an educational nature, rather than a fund-raising campaign.

The Crusade for Freedom assembly will be held April 5 in the Student Union ballroom. It is sponsored by the Associated Greek students in conjunction with Greek Week, but the assembly will be open to all students. The assembly will be a program of entertainment, rather than a lecture.

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Willamette University Prof To Deliver Easter Sermon

Dr. Thomas Bennett, professor of philosophy at Willamette university, will deliver the sermon at the annual Easter sunrise service in McArthur court at 6:30 a.m. The sermon title will be "The Cross is Power."

Dr. Bennett has done graduate work at the University of London and has received a Ph.D. from the University of Chicago. Previous to his present position he served as professor of philo-

sophy at Fairmont State college, Fairmont, West Virginia, and immediately before coming to Willamette was dean of the faculty at Kendall college in Evanston, Ill. Dr. Bennett has been at Willamette university since 1952.

He is a layman in the Methodist church and is active in the youth and adult work of the Oregon Annual conference of the Methodist church.

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'Oregon Jazz Society' Chosen as Club Name

Oregon Jazz Society was chosen as the theme of the campus' newly-organized club for jazz enthusiasts, at the group's meeting Tuesday.

Don Peck, Student Union board representative, asked the society to help promote the "Jazz A La Carte" concert, which will play on campus April 10. Society members agreed to help by distributing posters to downtown merchants. Members asked to have a reserved seating section at the concert.

One of the faculty advisers for the club, George Etue, presented a program of Buddy De Franco records which traced the artist's career of the last ten years. De Franco will be one of the featured artists at the "Jazz A La Carte" program.

C. F. Ruff, the other faculty adviser for the group, told the jazz fans that he is compiling a critical bibliography of jazz. Etue and Ruff showed members several jazz encyclopedias and histories.

The next meeting of the group will be held Tuesday, April 17 in the S.U. Membership in the society is open to any person who is interested in jazz. No dues will be charged. The society is a branch of the S.U. music committee.
