

Hungarian String Quartet Here In Concert Program Monday

The Hungarian String Quartet, internationally-known musical group, will present a concert Monday evening in the Student Union ballroom, as part of the University's Festival of Arts program.

The Quartet features Joltan Szekely, first violin; Alexander Moszkowsky, second violin; Denes Koromzay, viola; and Vilmos Palotai, cello. The Quartet regards itself as the guardian of the great Hungarian string-playing traditions. Its repertoire includes all of the great classic masters.

The Festival of Arts is joining

in the commemoration of the birth of Wolfgang Mozart. One of Mozart's works, "Quartet in G Major," will be featured on Monday's program.

In 1935, the four musicians gave up their positions as soloists in other musical organizations and their academic security in order to form a new group.

Within a year the new "Hungarian Quartet" was being heard in London, Barcelona, Paris and Vienna. Their success was immediate—the Nieuwe Rotterdamsche Courant said:

"We have listened here in the last twenty years to all ensembles of international fame. The Hungarian Quartet surpasses them all."

The New York Times writes, "We don't remember many quartet concerts on any occasion which communicated so much beauty and pleasure. These men lived in the music and the music lived in them. With an enviable background of experience and of living tradition, these men played instinctively together, and in a way which went straight from heart to heart."
