

Webfoots Blank Lewis and Clark

Take Third Straight Win By 8-0 Count

The Ducks made it three in a row yesterday in their opening baseball game at Howe field by blanking Lewis and Clark 8-0. Terry Maddox, Phil Bell and Ron Whittaker threw three innings apiece and shut out the visiting Pioneers on only two singles by second baseman Dick Toney in the second frame and outfielder Don Carrier in the fifth.

Don Kirsch juggled his starting nine again in an attempt to look over all new candidates out to fill the holes left from graduation, but still Oregon could only collect six base hits.

Top hitter for the afternoon again was smooth centerfielder Jerry Ross, who hit safely twice, but the big blow of the day was a three-run triple in the seventh by pitcher Whittaker who had just come on in relief.

LeRoy Phelps led off the first inning for Oregon with a single which was the first and last hit for the Ducks until the fifth. However, walks to Ron Creps and Dick Schlosstein loaded the bags pushing Phelps around to third, scoring on a fielder's choice.

The Pioneers big right-hander, Stempel, started off the second by pitching himself into a hole, issuing walks to third baseman Kenny Bond and catcher Tom

Bowen. Maddox then struck out, but Phelps walked to load them up again. Bond scored when Johnny Keller reached first on an error and Bowen came home with the other run of the inning when Creps flew deep to left.

Error Paves Way

Oregon picked up another run in the fourth without a base hit. Bowen led off with a walk, Bell sacrificed him to second, Phelps rolled out moving Bowen to third, and when Keller was safe on an error, Bowen strolled home.

The fifth produced two safeties; Bowen driving in Lundell who had singled and advanced on a wild pitch.

Dale Didier took over hurling duty for LC in the seventh and with one away found himself in deep trouble. Ross lined safely to center and Joan Lundell and Bond took four balls.

Up stepped Whittaker and lash his three-bagger to deep right-center clearing the basepaths. Ross hit again in the ninth but was left stranded.

Martinez Decisions Cuban For 21st Straight Win

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (P)—Clever Vince Martinez, one of the hottest fighters in the welterweight division, pounded out a lopsided decision over Miguel Diaz of Cuba Wednesday night to rack up his 21st straight victory.

Martinez, the fourth-ranking welterweight title contender from Paterson, N.J., hit Diaz with every punch he knows but not until the ninth round was he able to put the tough, wild-swinging Cuban champion down.

The aggressor all the way, Diaz was leading in the ninth round when Martinez suddenly caught him with a left and right to the jaw. The bell stopped the count at seven as Diaz scrambled to his feet.

In the tenth and final round, a thundering right to the jaw by Martinez knocked Diaz into the ropes and down but he got up again on the count of eight and was still on his feet weathering a storm of punches when the fight ended.

Judge Gus Jacobson gave Martinez 99 points to 86 for Diaz. Judge Stu Winston called it 99-89 and Referee Eddie Coachman 100-85. The Associated Press voted Martinez a 100-89 victor.

USSR Won't Dominate Snorts Olympic Exec

NEW YORK (P)—"We will meet Russia on every front," the executive director of the U.S. Olympic association said Wednesday in announcing that a 325-member team would leave around Nov. 6 for the Olympic games in Melbourne.

"I have been reading that Russia will dominate the games with 400 athletes and that the United States may have to cut some corners for financial reasons," J. Lyman Bingham added. "That is so much poppycock."

"We will send to Australia the strongest and largest squad possible—at least as large as necessary. We don't intend to give any quarter in size and strength."

Bingham compiled a list of Olympic tryout sites and dates extending through most of the summer.

"There is one possible exception," he said. "That's field hockey. It's not considered a major Olympic competition and there's

even doubt that Russia will enter a team. We are undecided on the matter."

The tall, white-haired Olympic official said present plans call for the team to leave Los Angeles in five giant trans-oceanic airplanes starting Nov. 6 "or there-around."

"Originally we intended to get away starting Nov. 11, but our plans were changed by a big send-off of some sort for the team planned by Los Angeles on the weekend of Nov. 3," he added.

"We are having a committee meeting in the next 10 days to iron out these details."

Asked whether the Soviet Union would outnumber us in competitors, Bingham said:

"They may, but I don't see how they can. Under the new Olympic rules, no country can carry along spares—or substitutes. Except in team sports, which also will have limited squads, a country may nominate only the men or women expected to compete in an event. If something happens to prevent that person competing, there can be no replacement."

"I figured out last night that the absolute maximum that a country may have is 395. When you consider that teams will use the same competitors for things like the 100 and 200-meter dashes and the field events, it's easy to see that the maximum won't be necessary."

"We figure we can send 325 and have full strength in every competition."

U.S. Olympic officials will be limited to around 50 under the new rule that officials can't exceed 15 per cent of the number of athletes.

"The overall operation will be close to a million dollars," Bingham said. "We figure a little more than \$2,000 per man."

Santee Claims Other Athletes Will Back Him

NEW YORK (P)—Wes Santee, the center of a legal brawl with the Amateur Athletic union, declared Wednesday "there will come a time when I will testify and the rest of the fellows will testify."

By the "rest of the fellows," he explained, he meant eight ex-athletes and three present athletes who are willing to come to his defense in his contention his expense accounts were not out of line with ordinary practice.

The AAU has suspended Santee for life for accepting excessive expense money. Santee is fighting the case in court and a decision is expected shortly on his suit to block the AAU from enforcing its edict.

Santee Will Appeal

Santee said he expected there would be an appeal no matter who won.

Santee told a luncheon of the Sports Broadcasters association he had expected to testify in New York state supreme court on his contention that AAU rules were a dead letter, but he was unable to do so because this part of his case was dropped when his attorneys were not prepared to go ahead with it at the moment it was called.

Santee's case is based on, (1) whether the AAU executive committee that banned him had jurisdiction and (2) whether it acted properly.

'AAU Accepts Hearsay'

"The way the AAU accepts hearsay evidence is ridiculous," said the star Kansas miler. "I think the rules on expense accounts are ridiculous."

"Dan Ferris AAU secretary-treasurer said he would consider \$15 per day expenses. If he did I'd be okay."

"Any athlete who flies violates the AAU rule, which covers train fare."

Wes Needs \$25 Per Day

"If I had \$25 a day expenses and plane fare I could justify every cent I spent."

"A lot of things are required of a star athlete. My expenses for telephones run \$60 to \$70 per month. You can ask why I don't call collect, but you don't always want to do that. Then there is the matter of correspondence. A star athlete needs more clothes than an ordinary person, and better clothes."



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
