

Duck Trackmen Clash with OSC

Bill Bowerman's Oregon track squad will host the Oregon State cindermen in a Northern Division dual track meet at Hayward field Saturday. The Ducks, defending Northern Division champions, will go into the meet without three of their top performers, pole vaulter Bob Reid, who has a badly sprained ankle; broad jumper Martin Pedigo, who pulled a muscle in the Willamette relays, and star miler Jim Bailey, who is running an invitational mile at the Texas Relays Friday.

The Beavers of Hal Moe figure to give the Webfoots stiff competition earlier in the week, but a recent injury and sickness have hurt their chances considerably. Top Aggie sprinter Sam Wesley has a pulled muscle, and miler Gene Tenney has been fighting the flu. So Oregon is once again the strong favorite in the big civil war test.

However, Oregon State will bring over several fine performers, in spite of their bad luck. This group will include Jerry Larson, a fine two-miler, and big Tex Whiteman, hard-running 880 man, who has turned in his basketball gear for track togs.

Oregon, even without three of its top stars, still will have some outstanding runners on hand for Saturday's tussle. Jack Morris will be on hand in the sprints and low hurdles. Gordie Dahlquist is slated for action in middle distances, and the Ducks' running machine Bill Dellinger will run in both the mile and two-mile.

A much tighter contest for team honors is expected in the

freshman division, where both teams are the strongest in several years. The freshman competitors from the two schools will vie in the same meet with the varsity Saturday.

Two of the Coast's best young hurdlers, the Rook's Paul Lowe and Steve Anderson of the Frosh

will battle it out Saturday. Two old high school rivalries will be renewed Saturday afternoon when state 880 champ Jim Grelle of Oregon faces last year's runner-up OSC's Frank Moore, and the Frosh's Peter McCart from Vancouver, B.C., and the Beavers' Don Ferguson from the same city meet in the mile run.

This marks the earliest time in the season that the Oregon and Oregon State track teams have met. The same two squads will meet again later in the year at Corvallis.

CORVALLIS (AP) — Undefeated Oregon State won its sixth consecutive pre-conference baseball game here Thursday, scoring a run in the last of the eighth to defeat Oregon College of Education, 5-4.
