

Richards Tells Plans For Closed Circuit TV

Plans to explore educational television possibilities through inter-institutional closed circuits in Oregon were revealed to the Oregon State Broadcasters' association Friday by Chancellor John R. Richards of the Oregon state system of higher education.

Richards, speaking at a luncheon meeting of the group at its 16th annual convention, told the broadcasters that experiments with educational television in other colleges and universities had shown that various methods of using the media worked satisfactorily toward educational aims.

Comp Taught by TV

The Chancellor showed how even English composition has been taught at New York university by use of two hours per week television time and one-hour writing sessions with instructors.

Richards concluded that this type of teaching has proved satisfactory, that it could be used within present budgetary means, and that it has been satisfactory for instructors, students, administrators and the general public.

Oregon to Pioneer

Oregon's specific goal in educational television, he said, should be inter-institutional lectures. Richards said he hoped Oregon would be a pioneer in developing this aspect.

In other business of the Broadcasters' convention, various business and conference sessions were held on campus and at the Eugene hotel Friday and Saturday.

Churches To Hear UO Group

The Philadelphians, Philadelphia House chorus under the direction of Erwin Boring, will make two guest appearances in Portland churches April 29.

During the morning services the chorus will appear at the Holladay Park Church of God. They will sing at the Ladd's Addition Evangelical United Brethren church during the evangelistic service in the evening.

The Philo Four, male quartet from the house, will join the chorus in both appearances.

According to Boring, the chorus will sing a variety of Negro spirituals, gospel songs, and traditional hymns. Bob Hinson will accompany the group on the piano and they will sing one number a capella. Hinson also will play special organ numbers.

Prior to making the trip to Portland, the chorus will sing at the First Baptist church of Eugene during the evening service April 22. They already have sung for the Eugene Nazarene and Evangelical United Brethren churches and plan concerts at some of the other Eugene churches in the near future.

Graduates and Seniors May Apply For Men's Counselor Positions

Head counselor and assistant posts are now open for next fall for the men's dormitories, according to Brad Blaine, assistant director of men's affairs.

Head counselors must be graduate students next fall, and regularly enrolled in the University at that time. Personal and academic records will be considered in employment. Duties will be the supervision of 60 men in a freshman unit, for which they will receive \$900 a year, minus the board and room charges.

Assistant counselors may be either graduate or senior students. They will be assigned on the basis of one assistant to every head counselor. Their general duties will be to assist the head

counselor in managing the unit. Assistant counselors will receive half of their board.

Men interested in applying for the positions can obtain applications, which will be due at the end of April, from Blaine. Further information may be obtained from Blaine at his office in Emerald hall.

Danish Architect To Visit University

Mogens Koch, professor of architecture at the Royal Academy in Copenhagen, Denmark, will be the guest of the school of architecture and allied arts on Wednesday and Thursday.

Koch will lecture on "The Study of Architecture at the Academy at Copenhagen" to the faculty and students of the school. The public is invited to his lecture of "Danish Applied Arts," which will be given on Wednesday in the lecture room at the school of architecture and allied arts.

He is considered a leader in studies in the historical architecture of Denmark. He does not limit himself to the design of buildings, but has achieved a reputation for the design of furniture, and other industrial arts.

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
