

PIKA 'Dream Girl' Candidates Announced

active part in the debate. Hinkson said the ASUO constitution calls for a primary, but that he felt there could not be one if no candidate files under party labels.

"And right now there is no independent party, no officers and no organization," Brandenfels added.

Hinkson said Constitutional amendments to do away with the primary and to establish a preferential system that would require a majority vote for election would be proposed to the ASUO Senate.

Don Bonime, who led a determined fight against disbanding, made this statement:

"Whatever the Greeks want I support. Now that we've voted, even though by such a slim margin, I wish everyone luck under a new campus political system. If in the future Greeks have cause to regret this split they have only themselves to blame."
