

Lindsay Is Guest Speaker For Honorary's Luncheon

Kenneth Lindsay, noted British political figure and re-nowned educator, was the guest speaker at a luncheon meeting of Sigma Alpha, political science honorary, Thursday.

In answer to the question posed by E. S. Wengert, head of the political science department, "what happened to Eden?" Lindsay had this to say: "Eden is a symbol of a malaise (frustration) and a lack of resolution and will power." He said further that "Eden needs an overhauling . . ." but that any man in Eden's shoes would find himself in the same position at this important time in world politics.

Eden's Position

Lindsay went on to say that Eden's position is not as bad as we in America think it is. He pointed out that in the last few months the British press has become very strong and influential with their attacks against Eden. He feels that a survey should be made of the British press and this plan has already been instigated.

The political economic planning committee, of which Lindsay is a member, brought out a

pamphlet against the press. As to questions on British policy, Lindsay said that due "to the super-complexity of government today, it is difficult to find out where the decisions are made." He said that Britain needs a foundation to make a survey of what the role of Great Britain should be in the latter half of the second century.

A Positive Approach

In answer to the policy question, he stated further "that we (England) need in our political and economical world a positive approach." By positive approach, he did not mean a crusade or a blue print of governmental actions, but persons who could clearly explain the government to the people.

As to the foreign policy, especially the England-United States policy, Lindsay said that "the two countries should have definitely met and evaluated their foreign policies, especially in regard to the Middle East, at the end of World War II."

Lindsay feels that the United States and England are now in the position of being unable to define correctly their foreign policies, and therefore it is difficult for the two countries to work together.

"At sorority houses, fraternity houses, cooperatives and clubs, housing conditions were found to vary tremendously from a standpoint of cleanliness and good housekeeping," stated the survey report.

Dr. Miller added that in some cases poor sanitation in living organizations could be an aesthetic or cultural problem.

Most houses want to have their houses conform to good healthful, sanitary conditions, he said, and accepted the survey reports.

No Forced Changes

The living organizations were not forced to allow inspections and will not be forced to make the changes which the health survey would indicate.

Points checked in the survey include general supervision and repair; bathroom facilities: one toilet, lavatory, bath per eight persons; plumbing; fire hazards: electrical wiring and gas appliances; rat proofing; lighting in rooms, stairways and halls: windows 10 per cent of floor area opening to outdoors; sleeping quarters: 50 square feet per person; garbage and refuse disposal; housekeeping and general cleanliness; food preparation and storage: dishwashing and bactericidal treatment, handwashing facilities, refrigeration of perishable foods, storage, cleanliness and general health of employees and approved food handlers cards.

An Added Service

The nurse who will be added to the staff next fall will be available to all of the living organizations for consultation in these areas. The new sanitation program will not be imposed on the living organizations, but will be an added service offered by the health service for the "health and welfare of University students," Dr. Miller emphasizes.

Living organizations included in the survey were Alpha Omicron Pi, Barrister Inn, Carson hall, Chi Psi, Delta Zeta, Earl hall, Kappa Alpha Theta, Kappa Sigma, Phi Gamma Delta, Pi Kappa Alpha, Rebec house, Sigma Alpha Epsilon, Sigma Phi Epsilon, Theta Chi, University house and the Vets' dorms.
