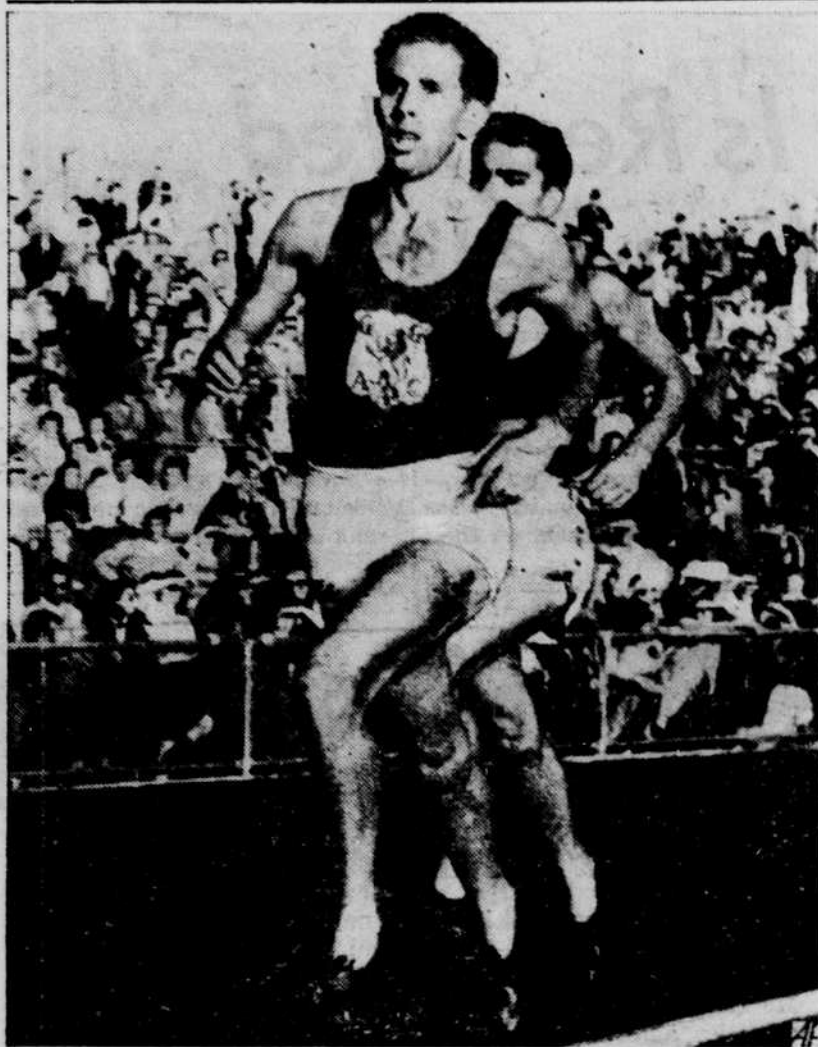

Oregon Splits Portland Pair

Coach Don Kirsch's University of Oregon baseball team won one and lost one over the weekend on their two day excursion to Portland.

Oregon, helped by six Pioneer errors, beat the Lewis and Clark Pioneers 6-4 Friday afternoon on the Lewis and Clark field.

Moving across town to play Portland university, however, it was a different story as the Ducks bowed 5-4 Saturday afternoon to the Pilots, one of the Northwest's stronger small college teams.

The weekend's split extended the Webfoot's record to eight wins against three losses.

Ducks 6-Pioneers 4

In the Friday affair, Lewis and Clark led 4-2 going into the ninth inning. A combination of pitcher Dick Fiske's wildness, poor Pioneer fielding and Jim Pipher's timely hitting, however, netted Oregon four runs and the ball game.

Lewis and Clark scored first in the fourth inning. Ray Meyer walked and Pete Ward reached first on a fielder's choice. Bill Acker advanced both runners on a sacrifice. Ron Whittaker, the Oregon starting chucker, then walked Dick Schlaadt filling the bases. Meyer scored on Gene Flippin's fly to right. Ward and Schlaadt both scored on Jim Raine's single.

This three run splurge ended all scoring until the seventh inning. In the top of the seventh, Oregon loaded the bases on two Pioneer errors and two fielder's choices. Captain John Keller then hit a sharp grounder to third base and two runs scored on the melee following an attempted rundown.

Lewis and Clark countered with a single run in their half of the seventh. Don Delbon, having gone in for Whittaker, walked Fiske and Toney who both advanced on Meyer's sacrifice. Both scored on Ward's double.

This set the stage for the wild ninth inning spree. With one out, Fiske, who had effectively kept Oregon's six hits well scattered, momentarily faltered, walking both Jerry Ross and Ken Bond.

The Lewis and Clark infield added to the confusion after Tom Bowen had "popped out." Dale Dickey loaded the bases when Ward, the shortstop, couldn't get the ball out of his glove. Toney, the second baseman, dropped the ball on a double play attempt, scoring Ross and Bond.

Urness, who was pinch running for Dickey and Keller advanced on a double steal. Jim Pipher, the capable sophomore second baseman, singled both runners home.

Jim Lehl, replacing Delbon, held the Pioneers in check in the bottom of the ninth and the ball game was over.

Pilots 5-Ducks 4

In Saturday's game, Oregon was the victim of a four hit pitching effort by Art Bull, the Pilot hurler. Bull, a freshman, had Oregon handcuffed except when hindered by wildness in the fifth inning.

Portland drew first blood in the third when they literally "exploded" for three runs. Pilot Lenny Farrell blasted a three base hit with one out. Larry Larson, the next batter duplicated the effort with a three bagger scoring Farrell. Dick Lindsay, Portland U's four year man, brought Larson home with a tremendous home run blow to deep centerfield.

Oregon tied it up in the fifth, ironically enough, without a hit. Stan Dmochowsky, the Oregon pitcher, reached first on Farrell's error. Bull then walked Keller, Pipher and Pingree in succession, forcing Dmochowsky home. Dick Schlosstein hit a sacrifice fly scoring Pipher and Pingree crossed

Duck Cindermen Win; Medford Relays' Victor

The University of Oregon varsity, led by Jim Bailey's fine performance in the two mile, won a four-way track meet at Hayward field Saturday. Bailey was a surprise entry in the two mile when coach Bill Bowerman decided to keep Bill Dellinger out of the eight lap race because of a cold. Bowerman pulled the smiling Australian distance ace out of the 880 and Bailey responded with a fine 9:16.7 two mile, one of the top times in the nation this year.

The Oregon varsity amassed a total of 62½ points to win the meet handily, although the Oregon Frosh led the varsity through the first 11 events and finished second in the meet with 42½ points. Lewis and Clark was third with 38½, followed by Portland Track and Field club with 21½.

The collegiate meet was preceded by the gigantic Hayward relays which were held Friday and early Saturday afternoon. Once again the powerful Medford Black Tornado reigned triumphant in the Metropolitan division. Bob Newland's cindermen carted home their ninth trophy in their last 12 tries, their fourth

in the last four years. Grants Pass, victor over Medford last week in the Rogue River relays, was second and Beaverton finished in third place.

The Black Tornado won two events, the mile and two mile relays, and had seconds in the javelin, shot put, 880 relay and broad jump relay. The Medford mile relay team of Leon Chistine, Wilsey Winchell, Pete Kershew and Mike Russell, ran the four laps in 3:30 to break the old record of 3:31.1.

The Cottage Grove Lions won their first trophy in the Class A division, running up a total of 69 points compared to runner-up Redmond's 43. Bend and Ashland tied for third with 38 points.

In the B division Bob Hoef's

Myrtle Point squad walked off with honors, while Sherwood was the winner in the class C running.

In the college meet, which followed the big relays, Gordon Dahlquist and Jack Morris turned in top performances. Dahlquist ran away from the field in the 440, turning in a :49.5. The ever-smiling Morris was a double winner for the second week in a row. The fleet-footed Oregon sophomore captured the 100 in 16.1 and was victor in the low hurdles with the exceptional time of :23.7, which is only two-tenths of a second off the school record.

Three Oregon Frosh stars shown brilliantly in the stiff competition. Two-miler Mark Robbins, who was twice state high school mile champion, battled Bailey stride for stride for six laps and finished second in 9:35.7, which is only two seconds off Ken Reiser's freshman two mile record. Freshman Jim Grelle, who was twice prep 880 king, won the half mile in the very good time of 1:57.7. The Frosh's versatile Anderson was the winner in the 220 in 22 flat and wound up third in the fast 440.

Doug Basham was an easy winner in the high hurdles for the second week in a row, winning in 15.6. Jack Moad continued to improve in the shot put as he tossed the iron ball 46 feet, four inches, good enough to win. Sam Whitney went 13 feet in the pole vault to tie ex-OSC great Lyle Dickey for first in this event.

Beavers, Seals Divide Games

The Portland Beavers captured the final game of a three game series from the San Francisco Seals, by winning the seven inning night-cap of a Sunday twin-bill 4-3, after the Seals had clinched the series with a 6-2 victory in the opener.

Watched by 7,311 fans, the Beavers held off a three run Seal uprising in the seventh inning to gain a split in the doubleheader. Bob Hall gave up nine hits to notch his first win of the young season.

San Francisco blasted Bill Werle for four extra base blows in the opener, including a home run and a triple, to clinch the opener.

GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP)—Sam Snead's putter, which had cost him so much ground earlier, delivered a 20-foot birdie putt on the second extra hole Sunday to give him a sudden death playoff victory over Fred Wampler and his sixth Greater Greensboro open golf tournament victory since 1938.

They had tied over the regulation 72 holes at 279, five under par.

Given a life when Wampler missed a six-footer to win on the 72nd hole, Snead came back to the course to match Wampler's par four on the first extra hole and get his winning birdie to pick up the \$2,200 winner's end of the purse.

Webfoot Bowlers Win College Meet

The University of Oregon bowling team won its third Northwest Intercollegiate bowling title in four years Saturday, beating Washington by 103 pins, on the Duck campus.

The Duck keggers had 5585 pins to Washington's 5482, while last year's winner Oregon State was third. The Oregon squad was paced by Bob Boyle who won all events, had the second high series, and tied with Vern Jackson for high game. Boyle was also third in singles competition.

Oregon had previously won titles in 1953 and 1954, and the win automatically retired the Brunswick trophy, awarded to the first three time winner.

In other events, Lee McGary of Oregon won the girls' pocket billiards, Ben Green of Washington won the table tennis title and Ralph Johnston of Washington won both the men's pocket billiards and men's straight rail titles.
