Vote Scheduled On Amendment

Editor's note: According to the ASUO constitution, proposed amendments shall be published in the Emerald on three successive days, and shall be voted upon by ballot of the student body one week from the date of the last publication. Following are the proposed amendments.

• Proposed amendment to Article VI, section II: (positions elected at large) Positions elected at large shall include president, vice-president, and nine senators-at-large.

Candidates for president shall be listed on a separate presidential ballot. Their names shall also appear on the ballot for senator-at-large.

The candidate for president receiving a majority of votes under the preferential system, as set forth in Article III of the by-laws, shall be declared president. The candidate for president receiving the second highest number of votes shall be declared vice-president.

The unsuccessful candidates for president shall then be considered candidates for senators-at-large. Nine senators-at-large shall then be selected under the preferential system of voting as set out in Article III of the by-laws.

In this election the senator-at-large votes for the successful candidates for president and vice-president shall be redistributed and counted according to the second choice indicated on the ballot.

• Proposed amendments to Article VI, section III: (Class positions). In the election for class offices, each candidate shall designate the office sought, (president or representative) and after the election of president and vice president, all remaining ballots shall be credited to candidates for representative only.

• Proposed amendment to Article VI, section V: All elections under this constitution and by-laws shall be conducted under the preferential system.
