

Atomic Energy Talks Set for Browsing Room

Atomic energy will be discussed by a geologist and a nuclear physicist in the browsing room lecture Wednesday night.

The main lecturer will be L.W. Staples, professor of geology, an expert in the geological occurrence of fissionable materials. Leading a discussion on questions concerning atomic fission will be Raymond Ellickson, professor of physics. The topic for the evening is "Occurrence and Significance of Uranium."

Staples will discuss the histori-

cal background of our knowledge of atomic energy, the world resources of fissionable material and the future of atomic power. Staples has examined nearly all of the uranium deposits in Oregon and many of the Colorado plateau.

At the lecture, to be held at 7:30 p.m. in the browsing room of the Student Union, Staples will exhibit various radioactive materials and some of the equipment used in the detection of radioactivity.

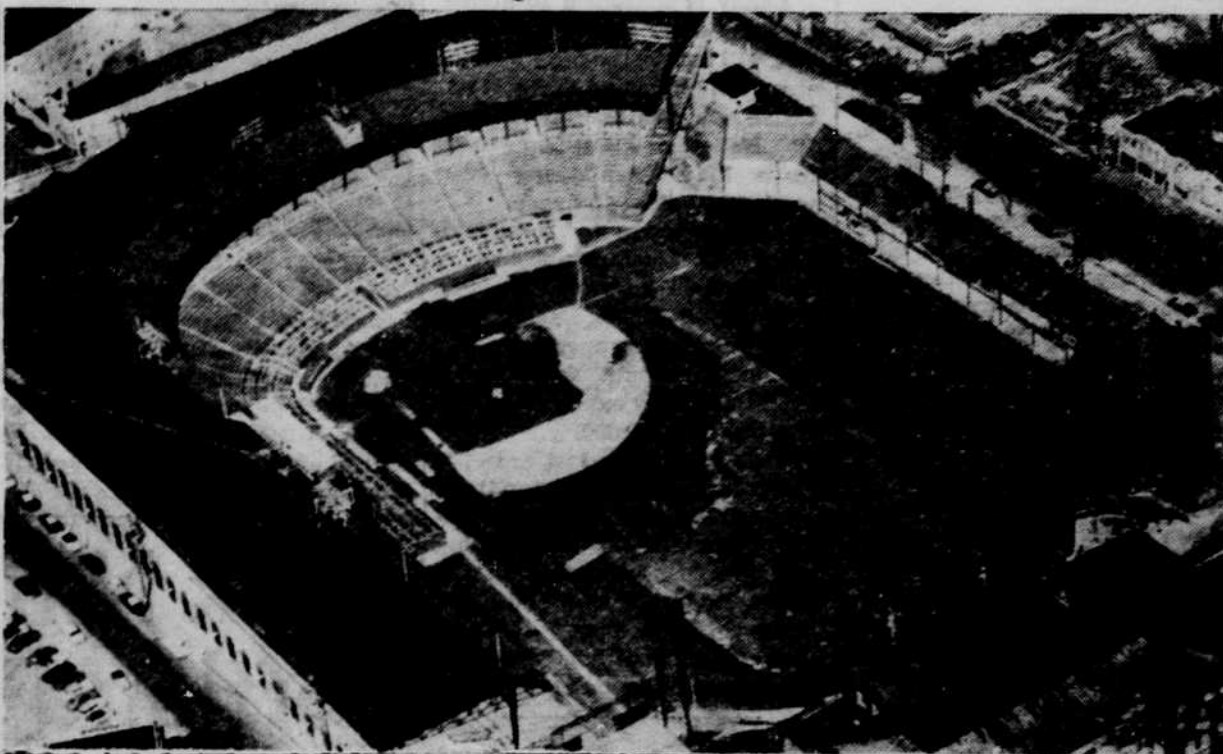
C-E Downs Ducks; Prall Cards 69
