

Aspen Music Festival To Be Held in Summer

The eighth annual Aspen Music Festival will be held from June 27 to Sept. 2 in Aspen, Colo. This ten week festival will center around 41 internationally known

artists and will feature the music of Mozart.

The artists will perform symphonic, chamber, and operatic music of Mozart. In addition to honoring Mozart, the festival will also pay its musical respects to Schumann, to mark the 100th anniversary of his death.

Some of the most notable music of Arthur Honegger, great French composer, will be played in memory of his death this past season.

Isler Solomon will be the Concert's director and conductor of the festival orchestra. It is the first time in the history of the festival that an American has been named conductor.

Jahn Behr, assistant conductor of the Metropolitan Opera, and John Newfield, production director of the Kansas City and Greater Denver opera societies, will be in charge of the Opera Studio and opera performances.

Traffic Court Conference Planned Here

The conference is sponsored jointly by general extension division and the University law school, representing the State System of Higher Education, in cooperation with the American Bar association. Past conferences have drawn commendation from several national traffic safety organizations and traffic departments of trucking and other industries.

Attendance is open to anyone interested in safety, legislation, enforcement, courts or other phases of state, county and municipal traffic problems.

Past registrations for the conference have included representatives from Washington, California, and Oregon. The registration fee for this year is \$10.

Marine Officer Team To Interview Students

A Marine Corps officer procurement team will be at the Student Union on Thursday and Friday to interview students interested in obtaining a commission in the U.S. Marine Corps.

A new flying program for college undergraduates has been opened, known as the Platoon Leaders Class (Aviation). Its major features are that members belong to it at the same time they attend college. They are sent to flight training as officers immediately upon graduation from college.

The Platoon Leaders class has been in effect since 1934. Members, who are draft deferred until graduation, attend two six-week

summer training sessions with no military training during the school year and are commissioned upon graduation from college. Both programs are open to freshmen, sophomore and junior men who meet the USMC requirements.

Officer Candidate courses both ground and aviation are also available to college graduates and seniors. Men selected for these courses take training at Quantico, Va., after graduation, and receive commissions upon completion of the training.

Ground officers remain at Quantico for Officer's Basic school while aviation candidates go to Pensacola, Florida for flight school.

Prof Elected Vice-President Of Mississippi Association

W. H. Stephenson, professor of history, was elected vice president of the Mississippi Valley Historical association at its annual meeting last week.

According to the regulations of the association the vice president serves in that capacity for one year and then automatically becomes president for the following year.

The organization originated in 1907 and has become national in scope since that time, concerned with United States history and related matters including Canada and Mexico.

Stephenson becomes a member of the association's executive committee and will arrange a joint program with the American Historical association in December, when he will preside at a dinner meeting.

He will also serve as toastmaster for the annual banquet of the M.V.H.A. next April.

E. S. Pomeroy, professor of his-

tory, also attended the annual meeting of the association in Pittsburgh last week.

Pomeroy is a member of the program committee and presided at the session on western history.

Journal Carries Article by Bisno

An article by Herbert Bisno, assistant professor of political science, appeared in the April issue of the Social Work journal, published quarterly by the National Association of Social Workers.

According to Bisno the article "inquires into certain practices of social work which are associated with attempts on the part of the profession to raise its status. It raises questions on whether these practices might also make social work less responsible to the people it serves."

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
