

Eugene to Host Top Tracksters

Tentative plans have been completed for an invitational track meet at Hayward field, August 11, involving many members of the 1956 United States Olympic games track-and-field teams, plus other outstanding performers from the western part of the country, it was announced Saturday by the University of Oregon and the Eugene Active club, who will act as co-hosts for the meet.

The event will be designed to give Olympic team members a chance at top competition and also raise money for the Olympic fund. The plan, outlined by a committee consisting of Coach Bill Bowerman and Art Litchman, the Duck publicity director, Harold Miller and Mert Heaton of the Active club and Dr. Ralph Christianson, a local track fan, will bring close to 30 athletes to Eugene for the invitational meet. Bucs Trip Brooks In Major Action

Pittsburgh dumped Brooklyn out of the National league lead with a double defeat, the New York Giants' Ramon Monzant pitched a one-hitter and Cincinnati's Wally Post hit four home runs during a winning doubleheader with Chicago in Sunday's baseball features.

The big news in the American league, where half the clubs were washed out, was the three-hitter that Herb Score of Cleveland lost to Detroit after striking out 13 Tigers. Bill Tuttle beat Score, 1-0, with a 10th inning home run.

The Pirates clobbered the Dodgers 10-1 and 11-3, thus dropping the world champs out of first place on a percentage basis. Milwaukee, idle a week by rain and cold weather, automatically took over the lead.

Monzant pitched a brilliant game after Del Ennis singled off shortstop Al Dark's glove in the first inning, driving in the Phils' lone run of the second game. The 23-year-old righthander from Venezuela, who had to be coaxed out of a threatened retirement during spring training struck out nine and retired 17 in succession after walking Stan Lopata in the second.

The Giants hopped on Curt Simmons and knocked him out in the first inning to give Monzant plenty of working margin. He coasted home 8-1.

Philadelphia took the first game 5-4 on the first major league homer by relief pitcher Jack Meyer in the 10th inning.

Post drove in eight runs in Cincinnati's double triumph over the Cubs, 5-4 and 8-4. His performance was only one short of the major league record of five by one player in a doubleheader, set by St. Louis' Stan Musial May 2, 1954.

plan had the support of the Olympic committee and AAU officials.

The Active club has undertaken to assure financial support of the basic expenses of the meet, although it would take but a 40 per cent sale of the 10,000 available seats at Hayward field to make the meet a financial success. Any profits from the meet would go to the Olympic fund.

The full details of the proposed meet will be presented to the Olympic track and field committee on June 24 at Bakersfield, Calif., during the running of the AAU meet. No further action is expected on the plan until after this meeting.

Oregon Narrows Hoop Boss List

University of Oregon athletic director Leo Harris reported Saturday that the search for the new Oregon basketball coach was running smoothly. Harris stated that the original list, which had a total of 60 applicants for the Webfoot hoop job, had now been cut to "about 18 names."

Harris said, "We have conducted a thorough check on the long list of coaches who made application, plus those who were suggested by other persons and those we regarded as having outstanding records, and we believe the job of screening has resulted in a rather fine group of candidates."

Harris added, "All of the coaches we are presently considering are highly recommended and many have compiled outstanding coaching records and I may plan a trip in the near future to interview as many as possible before the final list of candidates is made."

Harris refused to disclose the names of the coaches that are still on the list, but he said that he hoped the final selection would be made within a month. The list includes coaches from every section in the country, Harris concluded.

Varsity Netters Drop Three Tilts

The Oregon tennis team, finishing its most unprofitable tour of the season, returned home from a northern jaunt with three consecutive defeats hung on them.

The first match on Thursday, with Portland university, saw them come out on the short end of a 6-1 score. The only winner of the contest was Marv Woods, a sophomore from Ashland. This was the only match the Ducks won on the entire tour.

The following day the Webfoot netters met a strong Seattle university team, and went down to defeat in straight matches, 7-0.

Earl Ralf's charges next met the perennial winners of the Northern division tennis crown, Washington, and once again took a 7-0 lacing.

According to Ralf, the Huskies look like the class in the N.D. again this year, and he called them "by far the toughest team we have met all year."

The next matches for the Duck netters will both be home games, one with Idaho on Friday at 3 p.m., and the other on Saturday with Washington State at 10 a.m. Ralf had no information on either team, and declined to make any predictions.

Ducks Down Huskies; Distance Aces Star

Two records fell as the University of Oregon, led by Jim Bailey's double victory in the mile and 880, defeated the Washington Huskies at Seattle, Saturday 71½ to 59½. The Webfoots were never threatened throughout the meet, as they jumped to an early lead and maintained it through the relay event.

Washington's Larry Pulford put the shot a distance of 51'4" to erase the mark set by Paul Jessip of Washington in 1930, and Jim Bailey ran a 4:11.4 mile to top Oregon's Ralph Hill's time of 4:12.4, set in 1950. Bailey went on to tour the half-mile event in 1:53.8.

Wind Strong

Both teams were hampered by a strong unpredictable wind which blew dust from a nearby construction field and stirred up the chalk dust on the track. The track was exceedingly hard and the day was cool and heavily overcast. Despite this handicap, Ed Bingham displayed old form heaving the javelin 203 feet 2 inches. Another good performance was registered by Dean Singer of Washington who won the high hurdle event with a time of :15.2.

Old faithfuls Bill Dellinger and Jack Morris won their respective events, the two mile and the 100 yard dash, and Oregon captured a clean sweep in the broad jump with Martin Pedigo taking blue ribbon honors with a leap of 23 feet 3¼ inches. Pedigo, who has been sidelined with a pulled muscle most of the season, was in full swing for the competition although his thigh was heavily bandaged.

Abe Angel, Washington, set the pace in a close 440 race, but faded in the home stretch and was passed by Arden Christensen and

Jim Hilton, with all other competitors out of the running, made a dramatic attempt at 13'4" in the pole vault. In his first attempt he cleared the bar with room to spare and was on his way earthward when the wind caught his pole and sent it over the pit, knocking his bar down. His last two attempts were close, but to no avail. Oregon's Bob Reid cleared the bar at 12'6" for second place.

Frosh Winners In Track Test

The University of Oregon's strong freshman track team rolled over the SOCE varsity cinder squad, 94-37, in a dual meet at Ashland Saturday. The high altitude, soft track, and strong wind that blew down the backstretch made for many poor times.

Steve Anderson, the Ducklings' do-everything man from Stadium high in Tacoma, was the meet's top point getter with 18. Anderson won the 100 in 9.9, 220 in 22.8, broad jump with a leap of 22 feet 5½ inches, and finished second in the javelin, won by John Simianer who threw the spear 185 feet 5 inches.

Big Gene "Red" Estes, Springfield weight man, was second high point man as he picked up 10 points. Estes won the discus with a throw of 137 feet 5½ inches and captured the shot put, heaving the iron ball 38 feet 7¼ inches. "Big Red" was also entered in the 880 but decided at the last moment he was too fatigued to enter this event.

Mark Robbins, Oregon's outstanding freshman two miler, was upset in the gruelling eight lap race by the Frosh's tiny Ed Baldwin. Robbins, who has the fastest freshman two mile in the nation so far this year and rates in the list of the top 15 varsity two milers of the season, developed a severe side ache at the end of the second lap, and although Frosh coach Bill Sorsby told him to drop out of the race, Robbins gallantly carried on over the next six laps and finished right at Baldwin's heels.

Southern Oregon picked up nine of its points when it swept the pole vault. The meet also served as a telegraphic meet between the Frosh and the UCLA Babes, but the results will not be known until Tuesday.
