Hitchcock Talks On Education Aid

ROSEBURG (AP) — Republican senatorial candidate Phil Hitchcock said in speeches here Monday that federal aid for educational facilities must not involve federal control of schools.

"The people of Oregon," Hitchcock said, "do not want dictation from Washington in their education any more than they want such dictation in their policies or in their use of the water of this state."

He said a recent report of President Eisenhower's committee to study educational problems "shows conclusively that unless the government doubles aid to education in the next 10 years, our school emergency will degenerate into a first-class crisis."

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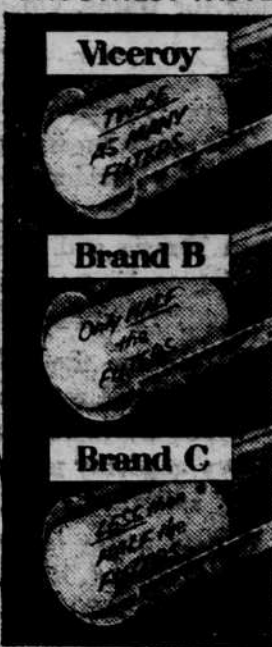


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Faculty Members Given Grants for Research

Twenty-five university faculty members have received research grants for the 1956-57 academic year.

Faculty members who received grants and their projects are as follows: Thomas O. Ballinger, assistant professor of art and education, and Norman D. Sundberg, assistant professor of psychology, an intercultural study and comparison of children's drawings in Nepal, and the U.S.; Robert Campbell, assistant professor of economics, U.S. government public land policy and market structure in the Douglas Fir industry; H. Harrison Clarke, research professor of physical education, study of the physical and motor growth patterns of boys, 6 to 17 years of age.

Bernd Crasemann, assistant professor of physics, experiments on the simultaneous measurement of the K-conversion coefficient of isomeric gamma-rays and of K-shell fluorescence yield of daughter atoms; David M. Dougherty, professor and head, department of foreign languages, critical edition of an old French epic poem; Paul S. Dull, professor of political science and history, functional index of the proceedings of the International Military Tribunal for the Far East; David P. Hatch, assistant professor of art, descriptive and comparative analysis of Jinh-paw properties in Northeast Burma and archaeological specimens from that area.

R. R. Huestis, professor and head, department of biology, linkage relations of inherited syndactyly and cataract in peromyscus; David L. Jameson, assistant professor of biology, thermophilic acclimatization of larval amphibians; Bert Y. Kersh, assistant professor of education, study of conceptual learning; James Kezer, assistant professor of biology, comparative structure of chromosomes in the plethodontid salamanders and testis

structure and spermatogenesis in plethodontid salamanders.

P. A. Killgallon, professor of education, study of intelligence and personality characteristics of retarded readers; LeRoy H. Klemm, assistant professor of chemistry, syntheses of substituted naphthalenes of potential cancer chemotherapeutic value; Richard A. Littman, associate professor of psychology, further studies of relation between infantile experience and adult behavior in the white rat.

Herman Rubin, associate professor of mathematics, computation of optimal invariant sequential decision procedures in the dichotomous case; Bradley T. Scheer, professor of biology, research in crustacean endocrinology; J. Arnold Shotwell, curator, museum of natural history, continued study of the Clarno eocene mammal assemblage; Peter O. Sigereth, associate professor of physical education, an electromyographic study of functions of anterior, middle and posterior deltoids and the teres major.

Jacob Straus, instructor in biology, biochemical differences between tissue cultures of pigmented corn endosperm and colorless somatic mutation; Sanford S. Tepper, assistant professor of biology, comparative study of the early ontogeny of plant inflorescence types; Leona E. Tyler, professor of psychology, factors related to changes in measured vocational interests of adolescents.

Norman van Gulick, assistant professor of chemistry, synthetic routes to some highly hindered t-butyl substituted compounds and properties; Henry W. von Holt, Jr., assistant professor of psychology, comparative analysis of the Rorschach test and the Hanfman-Kasanin test; and E. V. White, associate professor of chemistry, structural studies in polysaccharide chemistry.
