Cats, Pioneers Split Twinbill

PORTLAND (AP)—Pacific University walloped the Lewis and Clark, 15-4, in the opener of a Northwest Conference baseball doubleheader here Monday, but the Pioneers came back to turn the tables, 13-5, in the second game.

Even with a split Pacific remained in a tie for first place in league standings with Linfield which divided a twin bill with Whitman at Walla Walla.

Lewis and Clark, trailing 5-3, scored 10 runs in the fifth inning of the second game, all after two men were out. Fifteen batsmen went to the plate, knocking out five hits and accepting seven walks.

Pacific was behind 4-2 in the first game but surged ahead with two big innings, scoring five in the eighth and eight more in the ninth. Bill Braun led Pacific hitters with a triple, double and two singles in six times up.

Bob Gehrs homered with two aboard for Pacific in the big ninth inning of the first game. He banged out another homer with two men on base in the first inning of the nightcap.

Columbia Fish Season Opens

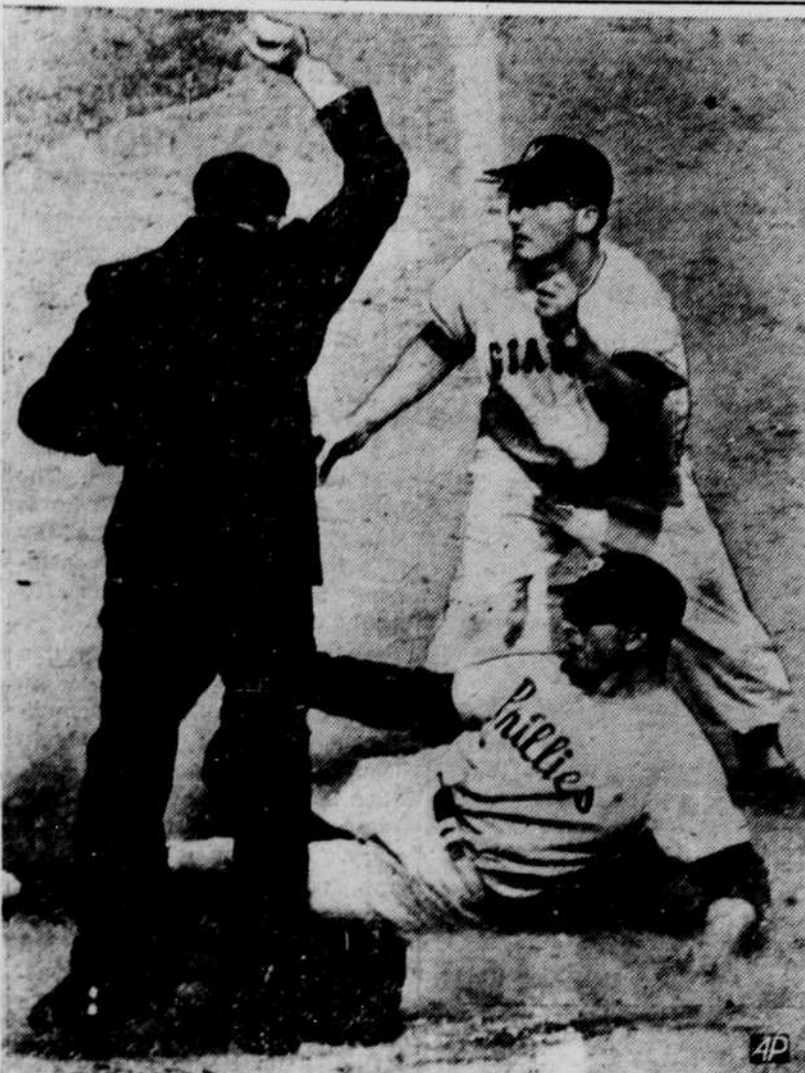
ASTORIA, Ore. (AP)—The spring commercial salmon fishing season opened on the Columbia River at noon Monday, with reports of spotty catches from most gill net boats.

Upstream at Oneonta and Dodson, Ore., about 300 commercial boats gathered for the opening. The first boats back brought in 20 to 30 fish each, or about 400 pounds per boat, on early drifts. Gillnetters expected improved catches after dark.

Three large seiners from Hoquiam and Aberdeen, Wash., were among the boats at Oneonta.

Arguments Continue In IBC Boxing Mixup

NEW YORK (AP)—Promoter Jim Norris, president of the International Boxing Club, and his partner, Arthur Wirtz, Monday testified for the defense to outline details of the IBC operations which the government charges act as a monopoly on pro boxing.

Wirtz disputed the testimony of Sam Becker, Cincinnati promoter, that Norris had asked \$150,000 to let Becker stage the Jersey Joe Walcott-Ezzard Charles heavy weight title match in 1949 in Cincinnati.

"Both Jim Norris and I told Becker we were not interested in holding the match in Cincinnati," said Wirtz. "We told him we wanted to hold it in our home town, Chicago, and we were not interested in his proposition."

Wirtz said he contacted Truman Gibson, then Joe Louis' lawyer and now an IBC official, in Miami in 1949 to learn that Louis was willing to surrender exclusive contracts to four contenders — Charles, Walcott, Lee Savold and Gus Lesnevich—for \$150,000. He said the deal was completed at Miami about March 1, 1949, after he had determined that the National Boxing association would recognize the winner as successor to the retired Louis.

Norris said he had been promoting since 1935 and testified the IBC had promoted about 515 bouts since it was organized in 1949.

He said he would regard a profit of 15 per cent of the gate as a "successful promotion."

Norris said it was customary to give each main event fighter \$1,000 and a share of gate

receipts and radio-TV and movie receipts from title fights.

The first defense witness was Gen. John Reed Kilpatrick, chairman of the board of directors of Madison Square Garden. He told how the Garden paid the late Mike Jacobs \$100,000 over a five-year period to buy up his exclusive boxing promotion contract.

Gen. Kilpatrick said Jacobs had been associated with the Garden as a 50-50 partner since 1939 but became ill in 1946 and finally agreed to sell out in 1949. He said Norris and Wirtz had approached him about a boxing contract but he refused pending a settlement with Jacobs.

The Garden official testified he had heard reports of the \$150,000 deal with Louis but was not aware of details. After Jacobs sold out, the Garden signed an IBC contract.

Poholsky Pitches Redbird Victory

MILWAUKEE (AP)—The St. Louis Cardinals, docile and hitless for 6½ innings Monday, shattered Warren Spahn's spell with three singles for a run in the seventh and went on to a 2-0 victory over the Milwaukee Braves.

The Cards slipped into first place in the National League by percentage points over the idle Brooklyn Dodgers, .667 to .636, although on a basis of games won and lost the two clubs are tied at the top of the heap. Milwaukee dropped from first to third in the day's only game in the majors.

The smallest county stadium baseball crowd since the Braves came to Milwaukee in 1953 — 6,090—watched righthander Tom Poholsky pick up his first victory of the '56 campaign with an effective, if unspectacular seven hitter. Spahn got the loss, his first against no victories.

NEW IBERIA, La. (AP)—Ray Mullins, president of the Class C Evangeline League, ruled Monday that Baton Rouge forfeited to Lake Charles a game it called off because of a city ban on Negro players.

Mullins said umpire Joe Powers called "play ball" and Baton Rouge refused to play.

The game was called off after Lake Charles presented its lineup listing a Negro player, shortstop Ralph Crosby. The city of Baton Rouge owns the park and has banned Negro players.

Baton Rouge faces another forfeiture Tuesday when it is scheduled to start a two-game home series against Lafayette. Lafayette has two Negro regulars, second baseman Sam Drake and catcher Manuel Trabous.

Mullins said the league would have to work out some kind of a solution to the problem, but he doesn't know what it will be. The next league meeting is scheduled May 6.
